

High School Boxing Teams of Roseburg, Springfield Draw

Roseburg and Springfield High school boxing teams fought to a tie score 30-30 in 10 good bouts at the Roseburg armory Wednesday night before a large crowd of boxing enthusiasts.

Best fights of the evening were Bob Rogan (R), 114, versus Fred Lohner (S), 118, a very fast draw; Lloyd Mayborn (R), 130, versus Corky Woods (S), 128, a windmill slugging match, won by Woods; Dawn Ellard (R), 155, versus Bud Williams (S), 159, a well-fought, hard-hitting bout, won by Lillard; Wes Ashworth (R), 135, versus Chet Diehl (S), 134, the best boxing exhibition, resulting in a very unpopular draw decision, particularly in view of the fact that Diehl should have been penalized one round for rabbit-punching, and the final match of the evening between Bob Wilhite (R), 143, and Bob McDonald (S), 140, a very hard-hitting battle won by Wilhite to pull Roseburg even with the visitors.

One of the best fights of the card was a preliminary between two Roseburg fighters, Wayne Fowler, 148, and Bill Anderson, 144, a fast slugging match, going to a draw decision. Ray Hall, 93, and Don Owens, 82, met in the curtain raiser.

In other bouts of the evening, Jake Lafoon (S), 136, defeated Melvin Miller (R), 138, Miller going down twice from showing punches. Coleman Phillips (R), 155, and Kermit Chapman (S), 156, fought to a draw. Bob Horrand (R), 153, won a clear-cut decision over Carrol Rauch (S), 150. Bud Overton (R), 128, and Nate Christ (S), 125, fought to a draw. Ralph Adams (S), 140, defeated Bob Hatcher (R), 137, in a free-swinging slugging match.

The bouts were refereed by Dick Reed, U. of O. Eugene, who made all decisions.

Washington News From an Inside View

Argument, Sentiment, Comment

House in Recess. April 10th will bring to an end the present series of three-day recesses for the house, which began on March 28. The house will then take up further appropriation measures which will be reported from committee, the extension of the reciprocal trade agreement, renegotiation of contracts, the Bretton Woods agreement, and federal aid to education legislation, which has been pending for several months. Hearings before house committees will be started or resumed on the above measures, beginning about April 11th, and some of these bills will begin to reach the house for debate probably about the first of May.

The senate has continued its regular sessions to bring its calendar up to date, and there is some talk that the senate may recess during the San Francisco united nations conference.

Food Investigation. The newly authorized special food study committee of the house will be very active during the house recess. Hearings will be held in Washington and probably other cities where the food situation is acute and the meat supply particularly short. The house and senate have already heard testimony from packers concerning their problems. With the 1945 meat supply considerably lower than the per capita supply in 1944, special emphasis will be placed upon the matter of distribution so that all sections of the country may share as equitably as possible in the supply of meat that will be available for civilian consumption. At the present time, and over a period of months, there have been some areas of the country where the meat supply was abundant, while in other sections of the country the supplies were low. The committee will endeavor to find a remedy for this situation if it is at all possible.

V-E Day Rumors. With the rapid advance of united nations armies in Europe, and the expectation of V-E day at an early date, rumors are being made more frequent around Washington. With in the past ten days, no less than four such rumors were started to the effect that special radio announcements would be made at a particular time, or that the president is preparing to make some important statement, or that Churchill is releasing some startling news of developments in Germany. All of these originated from misinterpretations of statements, or misreading of teletype announcements, but are indicative of the temper and anticipation here in the nation's capital. The more conservative experts on military affairs feel that, while there is a possibility of developments which would bring the war to a sudden close, the probabilities are that it will be some weeks yet before the heavy combat in Germany will end.
