

Mrs. S. Woodward, Native of Oregon, Passes On at 81

Mrs. Sarah Catherine Woodward, 81, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at Mercy hospital yesterday. She was born in Washington county, Oregon, February 20, 1864, the daughter of Elijah and Melva McKenney, pioneer Oregon residents. She was married to Elias Woodward at Corvallis February 27, 1906, and spent the greater part of her life in Corvallis and Newport, coming to Roseburg to make her home about five years ago.

Surviving are two step-children, Mrs. Winona Cave, De Monte, Calif., and Don Woodward, San Diego, Calif. She is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. George W. Leeper, Roseburg, and Mrs. E. E. Brock, Salem, Oregon.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Gerald G. Beckwith officiating, with Dr. C. A. Edwards assisting. The body will be taken to the New-Port cemetery near Corvallis Saturday for interment in the family plot there.

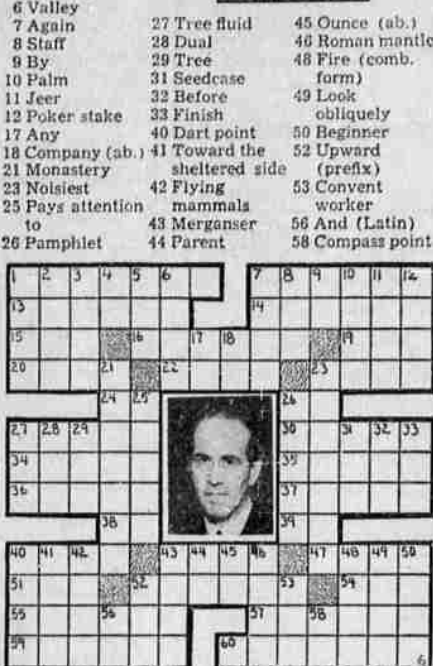

Proposal for Strike Meets 3rd Rejection

SEATTLE, April 5.—(AP)—The third strike vote sponsored by the United Brotherhood of Welders, cutters & Helpers in five days in Puget sound shipyards rejected such a walkout yesterday with the Everett, Wash., Pacific Shipbuilding & Drydock company

workers voting against, 2,397 to 338.

The independent union demanded the vote after the National Labor Relations board denied its request for a jurisdictional election, in its effort to displace AFL union as bargaining agent.

The Tacoma division of Todd Pacific shipyards turned down the proposal Saturday, 6,579 to 2,550 and the Puget Sound Bridge & Dredging company did likewise Monday, 2,205 to 479.

LEARN 'EM TO EAT.

Sometimes seems with little turk you really have to "learn" them. But some things will help accomplish the job. For instance, be SURE your temperature in the brooder is comfortable for the poult. Don't watch the thermometer, watch the poult. The thermometer MIGHT be wrong but the poult won't. Don't have them too hot, nor too cold.

Then it seems if you have the feed and milk up about the level of the poult's chin, he finds it quicker than on the floor. So set your fountains of milk (or water), up on an inch block of wood, and use those little pasteboard feeders, filled to the bulge with Umpqua feed. Usually that is all that's necessary.

The pasteboard feeders sell cheap at the Flour Mill. They also have "UMPQUA FEEDS" printed on the sides, and when the poult sees that name they go right to work. One man even told us his "poult wouldn't eat Turkey Starter until he put it in Umpqua Feeders.

IOLEIN MASH.

In treating parasitic diseases like coccidiosis, blackhead, hexamitis, etc., it is very important to keep the premises dry. This is hard to do when laxatives and flushes are used. Iolein Mash (or pellets), is not only the best remedy for these diseases we have ever seen used, but it saves labor because you don't have to clean floors two or three times a day. It kills the bugs inside the birds, instead of "washing" them out.

A CALAMITY.

The fire which completely destroyed the Watzig Hatchery in North Roseburg, ranks locally as a major disaster. The fierce blaze which lasted little more than an hour, wiped out the results of many years work and planning by Mrs. Watzig. Her financial loss was heavy and her life work is at a temporary standstill. The Douglas County Flour Mill offers its sympathy, and hopes that Mrs. Watzig will be back at the job as soon as conditions will permit.

The loss, however, extends its fingers into every part of Douglas County. Many are the growers who had eggs in for custom hatching, and many others who had orders in for chicks. The hatch on the day of the fire would have been approximately 15,000. In addition, eggs for the following three weeks hatch were destroyed.

These eggs and chicks held the hopes of many poultrymen for next winter's livelihood. The results of this fire help to illustrate how people, businesses, states and nations are dependent on each other.

The immediate problem now is to find space for hatching, and chicks to replace as nearly as possible what has been lost. Mrs. Watzig is trying to do this, already, but the demand for chicks and poult is so strong that nearly all hatcheries are loaded for weeks ahead. If anybody has unused incubators, or space to spare, now is the time to volunteer some help in this emergency. There are many good flocks here in Douglas County, which Mrs. Watzig has done her share in building up. Get eggs from such flocks, and find some place to get them hatched. Some flocks will necessarily be weeks later than you had hoped for, but in this instance it is better late than never. Count on the Douglas Flour Mill for all the help we can give.

BLUE VITRIOL.

We used to think feeding blue vitriol (copper sulphate) to turkeys and chickens was just another "old Granny" idea. Not but what a lot of the said "old Granny" ideas are still good. Many years ago we asked a man why he dipped corn in a vitriol solution and fed to his turkeys. "Oh, I don't know why I do it. But I do know it always makes them perk up, their heads get fiery red and they begin to strut and gobble, so I guess it does them some good," he answered. "Anyway it don't cost much."

Well, now we know that all living organisms, even humans, need tiny amounts of copper. Practically all mineral mixtures (and therefore most all commercial poultry feeds), contain copper. Maybe in the old days when no mash was fed, blue vitriol furnished the copper. We don't know; we are not scientists. But we agree with the man who quoted above: "It seems to do them some good."

We also notice in our travels that practically everyone who uses vitriol for his turkeys or chickens, occasionally has "better luck." Even the pathologists recommend vitriol for "mycosis", and a couple other diseases. Minnesota's Dr. Billings, one of the nation's leading turkey experts, and leading exponent of "nothing in the drinking water", finally admitted that bluestone might have its place, and even published the formula. H. P. Griffin, well known turkey grower and judge of the Oakland show says: "I wouldn't raise turkeys without bluestone." We recommend using it one day a week in wet weather and twice a month in summer. And we don't believe in "doping" poultry either. We think vitriol has never hurt poultry when used according to directions. And WE KNOW it has done tremendous good. Buy your vitriol at the Flour Mill, and ask for a formula on how to use it. THEN FOLLOW THE FORMULA.
