## Russian Action Leaves Japanese Sagging, Guessing

MOSCOW, April 6.—(AP)—Soviet Russia's renunciation of her five-year non-aggression pact with Japan unquestionably has dealt a terrific blow to the sagging Japanese, who were left today in the position of not knowing precisely what the Russian action means.

The Japanese know this, however—that the Russians seldom if ever act without good reason, and they know the Russians believe they have a good reason for ending the pact.

The Russians themselves made this clear in renouncing the treaty, declaring bluntly that Japan not only is an ally of the soviet union's greatest enemy—Adolf Hitler—but is helping Germany in her war against the U. S. S. R.

All Soviet newspapers printed the official announcement of the denunciation, but none commented or speculated on the future course of events.

Technically the pact has another year to run, but when one government tells another that such a pact has lost its meaning and that to continue it is meaningless, one would hesitate to say that the spirit of the pact still existed.

There was a lack of official comment, although some may be forthcoming in the immediate future. The Russians put out their announcement and let anyone think what they wished to about it.

In the opinion of some foreign observers here, the Russians only signed the pact with Japan in an effort to avoid a two-front war, being fearful of Hitler's intentions from the beginning.

## Two Unhurt When Jeep Plunges Into Coos Bay

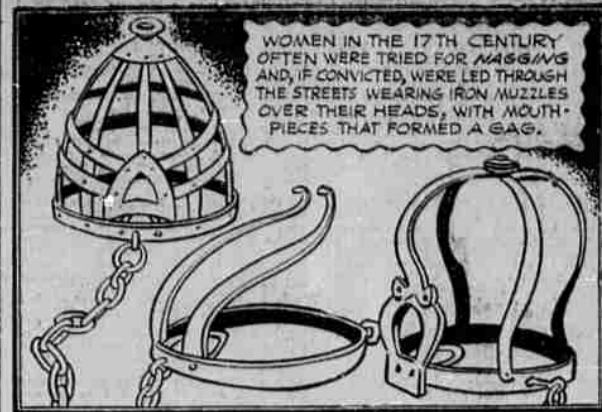

## Memorial Service Will be Held for Sgt. Keith Harrison

A memorial service for Sgt. Keith Harrison will be held at the Roseburg Methodist church at 3 p. m. Sunday, April 8. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hueh Harrison and was born in Roseburg Jan. 21, 1923. He was graduated from high school and died in France February 28 of this year. His only brother, Bob Harrison, is in the United States navy and is in training at San Diego, Calif.

Keith was inducted September 31, 1943, and trained at Camp Adair and Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. Because he manifested such ability, he remained at Camp Adair almost a year, being one of 26 men chosen to help with the training of recruits. He made so good a record that he was promoted to sergeant and was assigned to an officer's training, but he felt that his men trusted his leadership so implicitly that he should continue with them.

Keith landed in France the middle of last December with the 276th Inf. regt., and joined General Patch's 7th army. He spent Christmas at Marseilles and was with the Oregon Trail Blazers, as the Camp Adair men are called, in the advance upon Saarbrücken.

He was shot by a German sniper Feb. 24, and died four days later. He is buried in a military cemetery in Alsace-Lorraine, near the locality in which his death occurred, and services were held in keeping with the religious faith he had expressed. Colonel A. C. Morgan, his commanding officer, wrote the following words of sympathy: "On behalf of the officers and enlisted men of your son's organization, let me extend deepest sympathy in your bereavement. Keith was a splendid soldier of whom you may always be proud. May I express my own personal sympathy in your great loss."

Keith had a host of young friends and one of them, Don Kroegel, who is also a staff sergeant in the same company, learned of Keith's injury and was able to write of it to his parents in Roseburg. In this way the news of his hospitalization was received several days before the government announcement of his death. Before he went overseas, he had his good conduct ribbon and an Expert Infantry badge which he was awarded on "Infantry day" at Camp Adair last June. He was given a Combat Infantry badge in France.

Keith Harrison was a faithful member of the Methodist church. He was baptized during the ministry of Rev. Joseph Knott.

Mrs. Paul Geddes will have charge of the music at the memorial service Sunday afternoon, the Keystone class will supervise the placing of the gold star upon the Service flag. Dr. Chas. A. Edwards will speak briefly and Rev. Rinke Feenstra will give the memorial message.

## Walter Lintott Passes Away at Aurora, Illinois

Death of Walter Lintott, 76, cashier of the Merchants bank at Aurora, Ill., occurred Thursday, according to word received here today. Death resulted from heart trouble. He was the father of the late Russell Lintott and had visited in Roseburg on several occasions prior to the death of his son in 1926, and since that time has corresponded regularly with his son's widow, Mrs. Frances Lintott. His wife is a sister of Mrs. William H. Buzzell, Roseburg. He leaves his wife, and one daughter.

## FBI Seeking Fugitive Former Police Chief

PORTLAND, April 6.—(AP)—FBI agents have entered the search for Thomas Lester van den Heuvel, ex-Klamath Falls police chief charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, the FBI office here said today.

A fugitive federal warrant for the ex-chief, also known as Earl Heuvel, has been issued. Heuvel posted \$500 bail at Klamath Falls then disappeared.

## Hager, Ross Billed For Preliminary On Wrestling Card

Tex Hager, the extremely popular "Creswell Cyclone", will meet Tony Ross, the "Toledo Terror", in the semi-final match on the Saturday night wrestling show at the Roseburg armory, according to an announcement by Matchmaker Don Owen.

The rough-and-tumble clash will be a marked contrast to the headline bout between Georges Dusette and Gust Johnson, who meet for the Pacific coast junior heavyweight championship.

Hager, who only a year ago was the leading contender for the world light-heavyweight championship and lost to Gorilla Ramos in a title tilt in Mexico City, had a rugged engagement here last week, when he was awarded a technical verdict over the "Grey Mask". Hager suffered a badly cut eye from one of the Mask's head butts and won on a foul when the hooded hoodlum continued to batter Hager about the face.

The young matman said he expected to be in top shape for his title against Ross, an ex-middleweight boxing champion who uses his fists as effectively as the Mask employs his head butts.

Although the Hager-Ross meeting is certain to be a colorful "omnybrook", major interest is centered around the championship main event.

Both Johnson and Dusette are well known to Douglas county fans, the Seattle Swede qualifying for the title tilt by defeating Ivan Jones here only last week in a fine scientific battle. The championship engagement is expected to produce even finer wrestling technique than last week's pleasing exhibition.

Johnson usually concentrates on a leg-stopper hold while Dusette, with his powerful arms and shoulders, dominates with headlocks, chinlocks and full Nelsons.

Owen plans to present a three-round boxing match as the curtain raiser, starting the show at 8:30 o'clock.
