U. S. Fifth Seizes Key Mountain On Italian Coast

ROME, April 7 — (AP) — American Fifth army troops, continuing their attack near the Ligurian coast in western Italy, have captured the dominating 3,000-foot Monte Folgorito, and are driving forward against scattered resistance. Allied headquarters announced today.

Monte Folgorito is four and a half miles from the sea coast and 19 1/2 miles southeast of La Spezia. North of Strettoia, half way between Monte Folgorito and the sea, the Americans were compelled to withdraw slightly from newly won positions.

Two British destroyers and swarms of American bombers effectively supported the Fifth army operations in the Monte Folgorito area. The destroyers pumped shells into the German artillery positions. The allied communiqué reported that some enemy guns were silenced and others were compelled to move. On the Eastern coastal sector British Eighth army troops, in what was described officially as a "local attack," drove across the Reno river northwest of San Alberto and near the southwest corner of lake Comacchio. They took 60 prisoners.

In the aerial warfare more than 2,000 allied planes participated in a daylong attack on enemy areas in northern Italy yesterday, losing only four aircraft. While U. S. 15th air force heavy bombers pounded marshalling yards and ordnance plants at Brescia and Verona, fighters strafed rail targets in southern Germany.

U. S. 12th air force B-25s and many hundreds of thunderbolts, spitfires, mustangs and other fighterbombers of both the American and British air forces blasted gun posts, rail lines, fuel dumps, and enemy strongholds from La Spezia across northern Italy to Yugoslavia and the Dalmatian island.

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rail line to Weyern, Holland, and 35 miles from the North Sea in a double-barreled drive to seal off all German forces in Holland.

East of the Weser British and Americans enlarged their bridgeheads, some units within 18 miles of strategic Hannover, and south of them the U. S. First army's power drive, carrying almost to the Weser's headwaters, surged eastward through the Hessian gap. Behind these advances the First and Ninth armies pounded away at tightly trapped Nazis in the Ruhr. Hamm, the rail center, fell.

There was no confirmation of the German report that airborne troops were at Eilsleben, only 90 miles from Berlin, far ahead of U. S. Third army spearheads which have advanced to the area of Keula, eight miles north of Muehlhausen, and Langensalza, 10 miles north of Gotha. The Third has been reported 130 miles from Berlin and 58* from the Czechoslovak border.

In the first five days of April the Germans lost prisoners at the rate of 25,000 or more a day. The five-day total was 146,000 captured on the western front, with

probably 20,000 more killed or seriously wounded. At this rate of casualties there seemed little chance of a German concerted stand on the Elbe river, which flows 50 miles from Berlin and about 100 from the Russian lines.

Sarajevo Said Captured
Along the 350-mile active front in southeastern Europe, the Russians captured 16,340 enemy troops.

In Czechoslovakia the Russians were 38 miles from Brunn (Brno) big industrial city. In Yugoslavia, soviet cavalrymen were 41 miles from Zagreb, Croat capital, and Free Yugoslav radio reports said partisan forces had captured Sarajevo, scene of the assassination which touched off World war I.

On the Baltic front Russian units were mopping up enemy remnants on the Vistula delta east of Danzig.

Hitler Decree to Leave Stooges to Meet Allies

LONDON, April 7 — (AP) — The German radio announced today a Hitler decree ordering Nazi party district leaders to give up their jobs in local governments.

"All personal union between the offices of the state and the Nazi party has to be split up," the decree said.

The decree was interpreted here as a means of enabling Nazi party leaders in the provinces and towns to escape capture, leaving non-party members behind as stooges to deal with the allied conquerors.

At the same time the Nazis, who have announced the intention of fighting last-ditch guerrilla warfare, would be able to perpetuate the propaganda that German civilians surrendered while the Nazis continued to resist.

Agriculture Dept. Wins Land Disposal Power

WASHINGTON, April 7 — (AP) — The agriculture department emerged the victor today in its long fight to handle the disposal of millions of acres of government farm and forest lands.

The Surplus Property board removed this authority from the Reconstruction Finance corporation.

It also named the Interior department as the disposal agency for grazing and mineral lands, instead of the RFC.

Government-owned land in connection with housing developments was reassigned to the National Housing agency, while all real property not otherwise classified went to the Federal Works agency.

The land involved in the long dispute represents the government's vast acquisitions for military purposes, such as training camps, which eventually will be declared surplus.

"Yank Legion" Accused of Infringing on Title

PORTLAND, Ore., April 7 — (AP) — "Yank Legion," a new organization admitting World war I veterans and war workers, was accused today of infringing upon the American Legion's title.

In a letter to the Portland-headquartered group, the American Legion's national judge advocate declared that the name "Yank Legion" is a patent infringement and asked that it be discontinued.

Vincent E. Weaver, World war I veteran and Yank Legion secretary-treasurer, turned the matter over for legal advice.

Yank Legion, incorporated here as a non-profit organization, is being expanded into Washington

and California, Weaver said, and is intended to become nationwide.

Sedition, References to F. R. Brings Prison Term

New Orleans, April 7 — (AP) — A New York soldier court-martialed on charges of sedition and speaking disrespectfully of President Roosevelt, must serve a ten-year prison term.

Hugh Callan, 36, native of Ire-

land who was naturalized in 1936, was court-martialed at Camp Blanding, Fla., and given a 20-year term, later reduced to ten years by President Roosevelt.

New County Dock At Reedsport is Near Completion

REEDSPORT—Both the Port of Umpqua commission and the Reedsport city council held regular monthly meetings here last Monday and both received and paid bills relative to the completion of the new county dock in this city. Under agreement with the county court, the county assumed one-half of the expense of dock construction and the city and port divided the other half between them. The new dock is a fine and substantial structure and, while almost completed, a large floating dock is still to be built for landing purposes as soon as material, such as lumber and logs, is available. The bill for lumber submitted to the port and council at present amounts to \$894.74.

The port commission is considering a proposition of the Bridge Lumber Co., of this city, for the renting of additional land adjoining its present mill site and the filling in by dredging of a portion of the port property to make a new roadway to the port dock as well as to make more land available for industrial sites.

New Councilman Seated
The city has a new councilman in the person of John Marks, who fills the position made vacant by the resignation of Lester Johnson, who has sold his home property within the city and is moving to his acreage just outside the city limits. Mr. Marks, an official of the Bridge Lumber Co., was the runner-up for a council position at the last city election.

The council also contracted the sale of four of the city-owned lots to John C. Diehl, who will immediately commence construction of houses on the land for sale to mill workers who have already contracted purchase.

Oscar Gulovsen, city recorder of Coos Bay, and H. C. McCrey, the new city manager of that city, were visitors at the Reedsport council session. Mr. Harry C. McCrey, of Coos Bay, bears the same initials in his name as does the city recorder of Reedsport, Mr.

Herbert C. McCrey, but neither claim relationship with the other.

JAP FLEET AIMED TO REACH SAFE HAVEN, U. S. OPINION
WASHINGTON, April 7 — (AP) — A "good 25 per cent of the remaining Japanese major combat force" was lost or put out of action in the naval-air engagement announced by Fleet Admiral Nimitz, an official naval spokesman said today.

The new losses, he said, leave the Japanese with "a task force that can be handled very easily by any of our major task forces."

Emergence of the Japanese force, the naval spokesman said, was presumably an offensive action since it was made up entirely of fast ships. The possibility remained, however, that it was merely an effort to escape to more tenable waters. "Obviously," he said, "the Japanese fleet did not like its position in the inland sea which was becoming more and more untenable. Damage inflicted by our raiding air forces and observation from the air was very discouraging to them."
