Diocese Defers Plans For Merger of Schools

PORTLAND, April 11—(AP)—Plans for an immediate merger of St. Helen's Hall for girls with two private schools today had been abandoned as not feasible at present.

The decision was announced by Right Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, bishop of the Episcopal diocese, which conducts St. Helen's Hall, after a meeting with directors of Cathin-Hillside school and Gabel country day school.

The Episcopal diocesan convention previously had endorsed the consolidation. Bishop Dagwell said a committee was appointed representing the three boards to carry on negotiations for a possible consolidation later.

Survives 2 Years' War, Killed on Civilian Job

EUGENE, Ore., April 11—(AP)—Leonard T. Norton, 29, served two years combat service and came home to be killed on his first day at a civilian job.

Norton was struck by falling timber after a blast in rock excavation work near here. He died in a hospital here yesterday.

Miners Get Pay Hike; Idle Pits Taken Over

had asked all but two.

4. Second and third shift differentials of four and six cents an hour, respectively. Lewis had asked 10 and 15 cents.

Reportedly the \$1.50 average daily increase will result from an agreement on a seven-hour day with time and a half for all additional time spent underground except for a 15-minute lunch period. Overtime now starts after the eighth productive hour in one day and the 40th productive hour in one week. The miners are working a nine-hour day, 54-hour week during the war.

Output Slash Scored — The seized mines, where work stoppages have forced a partial shutdown of plants producing war-vital steel, are in Pennsylvania and Kentucky—where 24,000 miners were idle yesterday—Ohio, Tennessee, Virginia, Indiana and Alabama.

In taking over the pits as solid fuel administrator, Ickes said the work stoppages were "calculated to be cutting into steel production at a rate which represents approximately 100,000 tons weekly."

"Stopping work at this time is intolerable and unpatriotic," he declared. "It is threatening the production of munitions and war equipment just when our armies need our full support to win victory in Europe."

Every ounce of production strength must be used to reduce the threatening coal deficit of 40,000,000 tons.

Work Order Issued — Ickes ordered the seized mines to open for work tomorrow morning and designated executive heads of the mining companies as federal operating managers.

He called on the mine workers to return to their jobs and keep coal moving to war factories.

The wildest strikes began immediately after the Easter Sunday and eight-hour day holiday, April 1 and 2, despite Lewis' instructions to the miners to continue at work under a 30-day extension of their expired contract.

Previously the miners had voted overwhelmingly in favor of a strike, if necessary, to obtain their demands, presented to the operators March 1.

Aluminum Co. Accused Of Throttling Plants

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(AP)—Rep. Charles Savage (D-Wash.) filed with the senate small business committee yesterday a declaration that the Aluminum Company of America was "deliberately maintaining substandard wages and working conditions so they will be unable to get men."

"This," Savage contended before the committee yesterday, "gives them the excuse to say they are unable to get labor to produce aluminum in the Pacific northwest and is in keeping with their usual monopolistic practices. Such a practice will bring about the closing of the northwest plants."

Eugene-Florence Road Completion Projected

EUGENE, Ore., April 11—(AP)—Completion of a road over the coast range summit providing a through route from Eugene to Florence will begin after July 1.

The Lane county court plans to build a two or three-mile missing stretch. Previously a tunnel had been planned, but was delayed by the war.

Fellowship Week's Observance Requested

SALEM, Ore., April 11—(AP)—Governor Snell asked today that the week beginning next Monday be observed as world fellowship week and Dumbarton Oaks week.

He suggested that there be discussions during the week on peace proposals, and that church services be held April 22 to pray for victory and divine guidance at the united nations conference in San Francisco.

Diocese Boosts Goal

PORTLAND, April 11—(AP)—The Episcopal diocese postwar fund goal was boosted from \$50,000 to \$100,000 at the close of the clergy conference here. The clergy set Aug. 20-28 as dates for a young people's summer conference at Gearhart.

Red Cross Notes

Production—The production department has finished 432 filled kit bags to be sent out this week. Saturday morning the Junior Red Cross girls from Benson school, under the direction of Mrs. Dora Ritzman, came in to help finish them. To Marie Anderson, Donna Fromdahl, Nancy Fromdahl and Annabell West from the Junior Red Cross. Thanks. These bags contain a small soap box and soap, deck of playing cards, package of cigarettes, smoking tobacco and cigarette papers, pencil and package of envelopes with paper, small package of hard candy, corks, pair of brown shoe laces, package of razor blades, small book (pocket edition size, detective, humorous or adventure) and a sewing case. This case (housewife) contains needles, thread, buttons and safety pins.

Home Service—The Home Service department, in the last month has contacted over 100 interviewers in the office regarding ex-service men's claims, dependent's claims and many others. Pension claims have amounted during this month to eighteen for ex-service men with two appeal claims and two claims for insurance. For service men's dependents, family allowances and pensions 26 claims have been made. The department visited nineteen homes in the past month regarding claims of different kinds. Contact Mr. R. L. Preston, Red Cross quarters, for any aid, advice or help that Home Service renders.

German Prisoners of War—We must face the plain fact that the better the war goes for the allies in Germany, the more difficult it will be to serve the prisoners of war with supplies, and with transportation disrupted this has produced great difficulty in delivering supplies to American and allied prisoners. But every possible step is being taken by government authorities and the American Red Cross to improve the existing

conditions of these prisoners. International Red Cross in Geneva, Berlin and at the German port of Lubeck are struggling to obtain a sufficient number of German railroad cars and trucks to keep supplies moving to the camps. Eight to ten freight cars of food parcels a day are moving out of Lubeck, approximately 3,500,000 in southern Europe and 750,000 in Germany, at Lubeck are awaiting distribution.
