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News of 4-H CLUBS

Douglas county had four of the ten state winners in the 1944 State Bankers' senior 4-H club member contest. Marjorie Wright, Myrtle Creek, was first place winner for girls and will receive \$15 as first prize. Betty Lou Weseman, Days Creek, was third and will receive \$10. Doris Church, formerly of Camas Valley, was fourth. Her prize will be \$7.50. Jay Hooten was awarded sixth place for boys. Jay completed his 1944 projects but left for the armed forces before awards were made. His sixth place award carries an award of \$2.50. This contest is one of the few sponsored by the Oregon State Bankers' association in furthering interest in 4-H club work.

Announcement was made last week by the board of directors of the Roseburg Lions club that they will again sponsor the 4-H foods production contest for 4-H members this year. One hundred eighty-seven boys and girls received prizes from the contest sponsored by the Lions club last year and all indications are there will be more entries this year. The Lions club is sponsoring this contest to encourage 4-H boys and girls to produce more food to assist in the war effort.

H. D. Palmer and Earl Henry were appointed as a committee to assist Kenneth Minnick, county club agent, in making plans for this year's contest.

Marketing essays have been turned in by 195 boys and girls. Only nine club members were enrolled for marketing projects that did not turn in essays. The marketing day program is to be held this Saturday, April 14. The program is sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

The Lookingglass livestock club held its regular monthly meeting April 3 at the home of Kenneth Swift. Neal Meyer, president, presided. The boys discussed bringing of record books up to date and other problems in connection with their club projects. Mr. A. A. Jacoby, leader, assisted the boys with record books. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.

A new type of 4-H project has been added to the list of projects already available for 4-H club members. It is known as the

Oregon 4-H safety and fire prevention project. Purpose is to encourage 4-H club members to develop an attitude of care, judgment and consideration for the safety of others and themselves in daily activities; to eliminate so far as possible all existing hazards which cause accidents or fires in or near the home. The project is so arranged that anyone between the ages of 9 and 21 are eligible to carry it. Anyone interested can get more information by writing or contacting the county club agent.

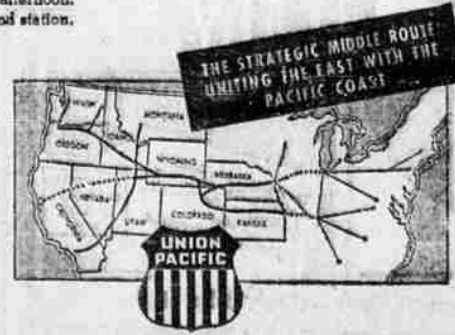
