prisoner of war camps and hospitals in which American soldiers were known to have been held. These advances have resulted in the liberation of approximately 15,000 Americans, but the nazis have hastily removed 36,000 American prisoners into the German interior, where 34,000 others already were held.

The transfer of these 36,000 American prisoners into the interior, along with thousands of other allied prisoners and millions of civilians, was carried out in many cases on foot, the statement said.
