

Harry S. Truman is a "wonderful man; very humble, very sincere" in the opinion of the Rev. H. P. Sconce, pastor of the First Baptist church of Roseburg, who for more than two years has carried on an intimate correspondence with the new president.

The correspondence started while Mr. Truman was still serving as United States senator, and prior to his nomination for the vice-presidency, when the Roseburg pastor wrote directly to Mr. Truman to learn his religious affiliation. The reply disclosed Mr. Truman to be a member of the Baptist faith, his pastor, the Rev. Jeffrey Swadley of the First Baptist church of Granville, Mo., having been a classmate in the theological seminary of the Rev. Mr. Sconce.

Following an exchange of letters, Rev. Mr. Sconce began sending to Mr. Truman clippings from religious periodicals dealing with varied subjects of national and international importance, and reports that to each he received prompt reply, often with extended comment concerning the subject to which the clippings referred.

"From my correspondence with him I have learned that he is a man of deep and sincere religious conviction," Rev. Mr. Sconce said. "He is clean in his habits. He has a deep love for his aged mother and his home. He is very humble. Criticism of his sincerity hurts him deeply. I think he is a wonderful man."
