Not long ago President Franklin D. Roosevelt said "All Americans want this country to be a place where children can live in safety and grow in understanding of the part they must play in the Nation's future."

If anywhere in the country any child lacks opportunity for home life, for health protection, for education, for moral or spiritual de-

velopment, the strength of the Nation and its ability to cherish and advance the principles of democracy are thereby weakened."

Bronze Star Given Sgt. H. I. Collison For Heroic Action

WITH THE 43RD INFANTRY (Winged Victory) DIVISION ON LUZON—Sgt. Harry I. Collison, artilleryman serving in the 43rd Infantry (Winged Victory) Division, has been awarded the Bronze Star for heroic action while in combat against the Japanese on Luzon. His mother, Mrs. Cora Louise Collison, resides in Roseburg, Oregon.

When enemy artillery fire was directed at his battalion observation post, it caused the wire communications to be severed. Sgt. Collison "courageously and at great risk to his life" exposed himself to enemy fire to make the necessary repairs in two successive instances.

Returning to the artillery observation post, he adjusted artillery in the face of intense fire, contributing greatly to the successful culmination of the operation.

The former Roseburg boy landed on the Lingayen gulf beachhead January 9 immediately following the Winged Victory assault troops who liberated

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the first Luzon towns. His artillery unit was in position and firing on the enemy the afternoon of D-day.
