Reds Transport Germans to Toil In Ruined Cities

WASHINGTON, April 16—(AP)—Soviet policy declarations calling for transportation of Germans into Russia to help clean up and rebuild war-wrecked cities already have been put into effect in the Balkans.

This became evident today from diplomatic information reaching Washington. It disclosed that:

1. About 70,000 men and women out of the half-million Germans in Romania—where they fought with and supported the Nazi armies—have been removed to the Soviet union. Originally Moscow wanted to take virtually the entire half-million but American and allied intervention against such a wholesale transfer caused Russia to reconsider.

2. An estimated 100,000 Germans have been removed from Yugoslavia.

3. In addition, still another 40,000 persons, who originally lived in Bessarabia, now Russia, have been sent back to that former Romanian province from Romania.

This problem of moving portions of enemy manpower into Russia is likely to be among the first diplomatic headaches besetting President Truman. It may be high on the agenda of any talks Mr. Truman may have with Russian foreign commissar Molotov.

There is no doubt among diplomats here that Russia intends to use such manpower as she finds desirable.

The subject came up a Yalta but evidently without agreement. Nor is it generally known here how many Germans Russia would like to import.

Roseburg Nurse Wins Promotion in England

THE 97TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, ENGLAND—Promotion of Vera G. Pinkerton of Roseburg, Oregon, from the rank of second lieutenant to first lieutenant has been announced. She is in charge of central supply at this United States army general hospital in England.

A graduate of the University of Oregon, where she majored in nursing, Lt. Pinkerton was engaged in private duty nursing until she entered the army nurse corps in March, 1941. She was assigned to Fort Lawton, Washington, and Fort Dix, New Jersey, before joining this unit at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

She is the daughter of Mr. John Pinkerton, of Roseburg.

Walkout Over Memorial Desire of Brief Duration

PORTLAND, April 16—(AP)—All workers at the American Can company plant were back on the job today after a brief 50 per cent walkout Saturday because some were determined to pay tribute to the memory of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Workers complained that Plant Supt. John R. Spence brushed aside a request for a memorial pause. He asserted employees had not asked him for a pause. He said company officials had decided to continue production because the plant turns out cans for military dehydrated foods.

Chinese Troops, Yankee Planes Bash Japanese

(By The Associated Press) Chinese today reported a series of successes in their north-central China counteroffensive. Fighting was reported in or near the suburbs of five cities including Laohokow, former U. S. air base city.

China-based U. S. bombers and fighters destroyed or damaged 30 Japanese locomotives, blew up cavalry concentrations, swept river shipping and struck at air fields in extensive sweeps. Five planes failed to return.

The southeast Asia command reported capture of Taungup, Japanese supply base on the West Burma coast, while British troops were making "rapid progress" cleaning up central Burma.

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Events Dated In Recreation Money Need

Smoker April 27, Style Show May 9 Included In Roseburg Program

Starting with a smoker Friday night, April 27, at the armory, the Roseburg recreation committee is scheduling some all-city activities to raise money for the local recreation program. The smoker will be followed by a Style Show Wednesday, May 9, at the Indian theater and a badminton exhibition Wednesday night, May 23.

The local recreation program is financed partly by federal funds, in that when the community funds were exhausted at the end of last summer program, application was made to the federal government for additional funds. The Lanham act, administered by the Federal Works agency, provides for grants to war communities for such purposes. However, the community must put up a certain amount toward the total cost of the program. This is usually secured from public funds, transfer of funds from other sources, a new tax levy or private funds to supplement what the taxpayer can afford.

The City of Roseburg guaranteed \$1513 for recreational purposes for 1945 and as a result the federal government allocated \$5235 for the period November 1, 1944, to June 30, 1945.

Balance Must Be Raised. The city park commission transferred the balance in its account, secured from public donations, to the recreational fund, which is administered by the same commission. As these funds were not sufficient to meet the guaranteed amount, it was stipulated that any money left in the city emergency fund at the end of June would be turned into this fund also. It is necessary to raise the balance either by contributions or admission fees to scheduled events sponsored by the city program.

The success of this year's program depends on whether more federal funds will be available for 1946. Application for continuation of this project can be made providing the community will contribute a third of the total of the whole program. Miss Gladys M. Everett, field representative for the bureau of community facilities of the Federal Works agency, recently met with the city park commission and made plans for Roseburg's recreational program. A tentative budget of \$15,000 was drawn up whereby the city would raise \$5,000 and the federal government would allocate \$10,000.

Judging from the past three months of operation, the recreation committee finds a definite interest in organized recreation in this community. The average daily attendance for the months of January, February and March has been 125 participants each day. This figure includes both youths and adults.

Activities Outlined. The recreational activities start at 4 o'clock each afternoon, with supervised games for grade school students. During the months of January, February and March every boy from the 4th grade up had the opportunity to play basketball at least once a week. Under the spring program, softball will be available under the same plan. Other activities for youths are mixed groups of volleyball and basketball at Junior High school on Monday and Thursday evenings; clay modeling and woodcarving classes at the Presbyterian church on Thursday evenings and the Teen Age club at the armory on Friday evenings. This serves approximately 200 students each week. Both quiet and active games are played and dancing is held in the gym. Members of the Junior Women's club, faculty members and recreational directors act as supervisors. Also on the program are three ballroom dancing classes each week under the instruction of Mrs. Paul Jenkins. Tuesday evening from 8 - 10 at the armory is the class for High school students and adults; on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons are classes for Junior High school students. One class alone has an enrollment of 60 students - who are learning all the latest dance steps.

Directors Listed. Among adult recreational activities is the public speaking

class given by Miss Amanda Anderson; leather tooling by U. F. McLaughlin and adult badminton.

The recreational program is under the direction of the city park commission, with Percy Croft as chairman and Earl Wiley, Kenneth Ford, A. S. Coen and Glen Wimberly as other members and sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Aileen Peterson is the director and the staff includes two part time supervisors, H. H. Turner for men's and boys' activities and Mrs. Vivian Kershner for mixed group activities. The office of the recreational director is in the chamber of commerce, phone number 370.

The goal for the ticket sale for the smoker is \$1,000. Tickets will go on sale this week. It is hoped that the townspeople will make as big a response as they did to the pre-football sales last fall.

Four Stores To Exhibit. The Style Show, second event for the recreational program, will be presented between shows at the Indian theater, Wednesday evening, May 9. The shops participating in this event are: Excel Dress Shop, Goldie's Bootery, Williams Hat Shop and Harth's Toggery. It is planned to present it at this time, as it will precede the Junior Prom, which will give the students an idea of what to purchase for both the prom and graduation exercises. Tickets for this event will be the same as the price of the movie.
