GRANDVIEW, Mo., April 17.—(AP)—"Harry will get along all right."

That is the considered opinion of the mother of the nation's new president, Harry S. Truman, Mrs. Martha E. Truman, 92, expressed confidence in her son in an interview last night. She added that she couldn't "really be glad he's president, because I am sorry that President Roosevelt is dead."

She explained that "if he'd have been voted in, I'd be out waving a flag, but it doesn't seem right to be very happy or wave any flags now."

Horse Racing Ban Not to Be Lifted by Truman

WASHINGTON, April 17.—President Truman declared today he had no plan to lift the ban against horse racing.

Truman was asked at his first news conference about reports that Former War Mobilizer Byrnes' wartime prohibition against racing might be lifted on May 10.

The chief executive stated he did not intend to lift the ban. He said that it had done a lot for the moral well-being of the country.

Salem Again to Vote on Buying Tract for Park

SALEM, Ore., April 17.—(AP)—The Salem city council laid preliminary plans last night for another election to let the voters buy the 43-acre Bush pasture tract in the center of the city for use as a park.

The voters recently rejected the plan by a narrow margin, but since the last election, the pur-

chase price has been cut from \$175,000 to \$125,000.

The new election would be held June 22, at the same time as the special state election to provide new revenues for state buildings and schools.
