Baiting for Root Weevils in Berries Should Begin Now

Now is the time to apply bait for control of the group of strawberry root weevils which began appearing about the first of April, says Robert E. Rieder, O. S. C. extension entomologist and plant pathologist.

Adult weevils often begin emerging during March and early in April and begin laying their eggs during April, May and June. This early group of root weevils has been responsible for weevil infestations continuing in many strawberry plantings the past few years, Rieder says. Formerly when it was not known that there was an early emergence of weevils and baiting was delayed until around the first picking of strawberries, control measures were usually unsuccessful.

At least two applications of bait should be made, Rieder says, one early in April for the early weevils and the second about the time of the second picking of berries for the late weevils. Other applications may be necessary, he adds.

Automatic Feed Grinder Devised By Elkton Farmer

An automatic regulator for electric feed grinders is suggested by F. E. Price, head of the department of agricultural engineering at the O.S.C. experiment station, as one improvement in farm equipment that would greatly improve the usefulness of one to five horsepower feed grinders and incidentally increase the use of electricity on farms. Price is one of a number of contributors to a symposium prepared by the Rural Electrification administration covering recommendations from agricultural engineers from 11 states.

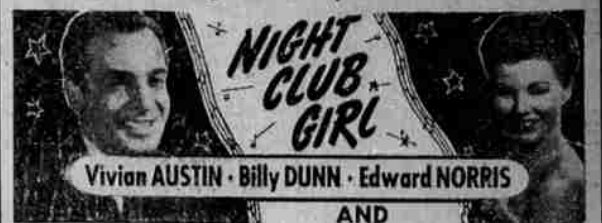
Price reported that such an automatic device was developed by Howard F. Carnes, who is operating a farm near Elkton, Or. The automatic feed flow regulator for small electric feed grinders was patented but has not yet been manufactured.

The report by REA is intended for American manufacturers who are preparing to market new and improved equipment for farmers

after the war. Much research has been done by college and other laboratories resulting in new electric equipment for use on farms, that has never been carried to the manufacturing stage, according to REA officials. Manufacturers will soon be ready to develop such devices, they add.
