United Effort For World Peace Hope Of Mrs. Roosevelt

NEW YORK, April 17 (AP) — Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today resumed her column "My Day," in which she said "when you have lived for a long time in close contact with the loss and grief which today pervades the world, any personal sorrow seems to be lost in the general sadness of humanity."

The column was interrupted by the death of President Roosevelt last Thursday.

"There is only one way in which those of us who live can repay the debt we owe to the memory of the man who has given us the most precious gift of all — peace and justice," Mrs. Roosevelt wrote. "They died in the hope that, through their sacrifice, an enduring peace would be built and a more just world would emerge for humanity."

"Any man in public life is bound, in the course of years, to create certain enemies," she added. "But when he is gone, his main objectives stand out clearly and one may hope that a spirit of unity may arouse the people and their leaders to a complete understanding of his objectives and a determination to achieve those objectives themselves."

Two Morticians, Missing 5 Months, Said Seen Alive

SEATTLE, April 18 (AP) — Discovery of new clues tending toward the belief that John F. Hennessy and Earl J. Cassidy, Seattle morticians who vanished Nov. 24, are still alive was announced yesterday by Detective Lt. C. E. Neuser.

The detective said a Seattle woman informant, who earlier had given some "straight" information on another case, told police late in January the two men were "still alive and 'shacking up' on the outskirts of a Spokane suburb, living in a clapboard house or log cabin with a big fir tree growing near one end."

Neuser said a trip to Spokane had uncovered a service station operator at Chatterbox who said a man "he is positive is Hennessy had bought some gasoline from him less than 30 days before."

Other reports of the men having been seen also have been received, he said.

Rewards totaling \$2,250 still stand for the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for the disappearance and \$150 for recovery of the sedan which the pair drove away from the home of a friend.

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Contribution of Douglas in Polio Campaign \$7,428

A total of \$7,428.33 was contributed by Douglas county to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the recent drive, according to the final report made by Roy Sunderland, county campaign director. The reported sum was raised in 18 areas of the county and is more than that of any previous year. It includes \$1,035.69 raised separately by theaters, and \$127.80 in dimes arranged on a board for the publicity of Redspots and sent to Washington, D. C.

"While lack of detailed expense reports made it impossible to tell the actual amount raised in the county, we feel that we must have achieved our goal of a mile of dimes if we were to have paid for the publicity in the newspaper and radio, and for the hire of halls, orchestras and theaters, as well as other items that went into the drive," says Mr. Sunderland.

"This drive was highly successful chiefly because of the active support given by the area directors throughout the county, and by their many helpers, particularly women, whose efforts contributed materially in boosting the total."

"Clubs, theaters, granges, schools, lodges, businesses and the A. F. of L. locals were generally enthusiastic in their support, while gifts from miscellaneous sources accounted for two-thirds of the total."

Half of the above funds have been remitted to the national organization to be utilized in the virus research program, for studies on prevention and treatment of after-effects, for education aimed at major problems presented by the disease, and actual treatment of the cases.

The remainder has been retained to provide medical, hospital, nursing and special care needed by local patients, and will be managed by the Douglas county chapter.
