Support Prices For Vegetables Extended by AAA

The grower support price program for canning vegetables has been extended to cover all vegetables grown for canning in 1945, the state AAA committee has announced. The program previously had applied only to green peas, snap beans, sweet corn and tomatoes.

Specific support prices have been established for all Oregon vegetables. Canners who agree to pay not less than the support price will be certified by the state committee. Growers will obtain the support price by contracting with a certified canner.

Certification of canners has been completed for peas, snap beans, sweet corn and tomatoes. Canners have until May 10 to apply for certification on the other vegetables, and a report on contracting performance is required by July 30.

Oregon support prices for vegetables other than the four included in the original program are as follows:

Asparagus—No. 1 grade, \$160 a ton; No. 2, \$100 (14 cent per pound additional for delivery to the cannery).

Green lima beans, other than Fordhook variety, \$125 a ton.

Beets—\$21 per ton.

Cabbage for kraut—\$15 per ton.

Carrots—\$90 per ton.

Spinach—\$30 per ton, above-crown cutting; \$35 per ton below-crown.

All other vegetables, including squash, pumpkin, and broccoli—each canner's 1942 price plus 20 per cent.

Ernie Pyle to be Buried Alongside Soldier Comrades

IE ISLAND, Ryukyu, April 19.—(AP)—Ernie Pyle will be buried with simple military honors here tomorrow alongside G. I. Joe, his friends and comrades in life and death.

Army Chaplain N. B. Saucier of Coffeyville, Miss., who went with litter bearers under Japanese fire to recover the body of the famed author and war correspondent, will officiate at the ceremony.

The little guy, beloved by every G. I. Joe, fell in action yesterday morning on Ie—a little island nobody ever heard of before Pearl Harbor.

Of the hundreds of 10th army troops to land on Ie, 15 were killed during the first three days. Ernie was the 15th American to die there.

He wore his helmet because, as he told a friend "I try not to take any foolish chances but there's just no way to play it completely safe and still do your job."

Pyle recently told friends on Guam, Marianas islands, that he had a premonition something might happen to him in the operation, but despite their suggestion he remain there, the little columnist continued with the invading force.

heights in a bitter 60-hour battle. The advance appeared to have loosened German defenses before the Po valley gateway city and gave the Americans a downhill road to Bologna. For the first time in six months the Germans have been deprived of heights which enabled them to pour fire down on American positions.

Nutrition Work's Value Pointed Out By Food Expert

The value of a state, county, or local nutrition committee is often underestimated, states Miss Doris McWhorter, war food administrator. The national nutrition program is now being carried out through state nutrition committees in all states, together with approximately 3,500 county and local nutrition committees cooperating.

The nutrition program, which is coordinated and administered through the nutrition programs branch of the War Food Administration, has a two-fold purpose.

(1) To improve the nutritional status of the people—shown to be distressingly low by the draft examinations—by teaching the American people the elementary principles of nutrition and food values; (2) to show people how to adjust their buying and food habits to the wartime changes in food supplies, to rationing programs and price regulations, so that they can support the government's wartime food program.

Local dietary deficiencies are often discovered by dietary surveys and nutrition clinics.

Thief Taps Till, Leaves Gasoline, Oil Coupons

100,000 Pacific Coast Workers Facing Lay-Off

LOS ANGELES, April 19.—(AP)—West coast shipyards and airplane factories will lay off 100,000 workers within the next 90 days because of cutbacks and contract terminations, Glenn Brockway, deputy regional director for the War Manpower Commission, predicted yesterday.

A reemployment program to cushion the layoffs is to be considered.

Goebbels Calls on Nazis To Stand Behind Hitler

LONDON, April 19.—(AP)—Propaganda Minister Goebbels told the German people today the nation was "balancing on the razor's edge" and called upon them to stand behind Hitler and "by a last all-out effort make sure that the reich does not break apart."

While acknowledging the seriousness of the war situation, Goebbels sought to bolster German hopes by telling the nation that "the perverted coalition between plutocracy and bolshevism is cracking and the head of the

enemy conspiracy has been struck off by fate."

This obviously was a reference to the death of President Roosevelt, but Goebbels did not mention him by name.

Pastor Resigns to Enter Evangelistic Field

The Rev. Gerald Beckwith, pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness church in Roseburg, will leave Friday for Silverton, Ore., where he will conduct a week's evangelistic service. He has resigned his Roseburg pastorate to enter the evangelistic field and will move his family to Michigan. His first meetings after leaving Oregon are to start at Massey, Ont., Can.

May 13. He has served the Roseburg church since March, 1944. His successor in the local pastorate has not yet been named.
