Ammunition Depot Workers Sought

James W. Campbell, labor recruiter for the naval ammunition depot, Hawthorne, Nev., arrived in Roseburg Wednesday night and will remain through Saturday in an effort to recruit single men or men without dependents to train as ammunition handlers. The Nevada depot, he states, is the world's largest and is preparing and issuing ammunition for the Pacific fleet. Due to the increased tempo of Pacific warfare, the ammunition supply task is growing steadily and an acute manpower shortage has developed.

Mr. Campbell is making his headquarters at the U. S. employment service office in the courthouse at Roseburg. Starting pay at the ammunition depot, operated under naval supervision, is 88 cents per hour, he states, with rapid advancement following training.

Seattle, Portland Lose Openers on Their Home Fields

(By the Associated Press) • Seattle and Portland, riding the crest of early season Pacific Coast league winning streaks, both tumbled to defeat last night in opening games on their home fields.

The Rainiers, leading the loop, received a 3-2 rap at the hands of the Oakland A's, who moved into third place. Stromme received credit for the win, though he was relieved on the mound in the seventh by Gibson when Seattle scored its second run.

Veteran Ad Liska of the Beavers weakened in the ninth inning to allow the lowly Hollywood Stars to squeeze across their two runs, giving the cellar-dwellers a 2-1 victory. Moran, Hollywood first baseman, scored the winning run when Shortstop O'Neil threw low on a ground ball.

The Angels and San Diego split a twin bill at Los Angeles, the Padres coping the opener, 9-4, and the Angels the nightcap, 5-1. The league's leading pitcher, Dummer of San Diego, racked up his sixth straight win in the first game. Novikoff, the madcap Russian catcher from the Chicago Cubs, clinched the nightcap for Los Angeles with a three-run homer in the first inning.

Sacramento dropped from third to fourth place with its second straight loss to San Francisco, losing a loosely-played game to the Seals, 10-9.

The Padres exploded in the eighth for five runs to knot the score at 9-all, but a sharp single by Uhl in the last of the ninth brought in Truitta to give the Seals the game.
