SALEM, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—House bill 378, which restricts commercial fishing in coastal streams, is constitutional, Attorney General Neuner ruled today for the state fish commission.

The commission said constitutionality of the bill was questioned on grounds that the title of the bill did not include the subject matter of the measure.

Neuner said the bill's effective date is Jan. 1, 1946, but if a referendum move against it is successful, it would not become law unless the people approve it at the general election in November, 1946.
