Achiu Defeats Morelli; Piluso Conquers M'Euin

Walter "Sneeze" Achiu won a popular victory over Tony Morelli at the Roseburg armory last Saturday night in what was a wrestling match only so far as the winner was concerned. To say that Morelli was dirty would be a gross understatement. Despite a weight advantage of at least ten pounds, the 195-pound newcomer to local wrestling addicts figuratively hurled the book of rules out of the building, but he succeeded in capturing only the first fall of the three-round combat.

By dint of repeated body slugging, sometimes treacherously upon forced breaks by Referee Owen, and strange holds, followed by a body press, Tony was awarded the first round in 14:30. He didn't even wait for the bell to start hostilities in the second stanza or for Achiu to get inside the ropes. When the Oriental stepped on the outer edge of the platform, Morelli knocked him to the floor. "Sneeze" promptly climbed back and began swapping punches with Tony, while the referee tried vainly to halt the men. One of the Chinaman's punches landed on Tony's jaw, flooring him. Sneeze promptly applied a body press for a verdict. The whole session lasted 39 seconds, just about the time the cops gather at the ringside in apparent expectation of a riot on part of infuriated ringworms.

Third and deciding fall went to "Sneeze" in 9-02 after another hectic clash, which closed with a duel of drop kicks and punch trading that softened Tony for a second decisive body press.

Piluso Also Wins — Another first-nighter to fans was Ernie Piluso of Portland, who defeated Billy McCain in a three fall match with his deadly headlock. Kidney and stomach punches wounded Ernie sufficiently to make him succumb to a body press in the first round, in 14:30. The headlock decided the match, however, in the next two falls, taken by Piluso in the respective periods of 3 minutes flat and 6:22.

Piluso takes on the Gray Mask in Portland tonight. The hooded monster is also billed in the headliner in Roseburg next Saturday night. His opponent will be Achiu.

Coffee-Scalded Woman In Serious Condition

Morse Demands Housing For Vets at College

WASHINGTON, April 23 — (AP) — Adequate housing accommodations for war veterans returning to college is urged by Senator Morse (R-Ore.).

Morse told a reporter he has asked federal housing officials to study the program outlined for Eugene, Ore., and determine whether low cost federal financing can be provided.

The Eugene plan proposed court-type homes, built on university property and heated from the university plant.

"War veterans," Morse told housing officials, "should not be called on to endure further periods of separation from their families. Everything should be done to provide housing accommodations."

War Atrocities Probe Demanded in Congress

WASHINGTON, April 23 — (AP) — Establishment of a war atrocities commission to catalog Nazi mistreatment of prisoners was demanded in congress today.

Three representatives introduced resolutions in the house proposing creation of such an agency.

Several others expressed resentment and indignation over new reports of atrocities and commended General Eisenhower for asking a group of congressmen and editors to visit Europe to witness the cruelties.

Seventeen publishers and editors and 15 legislators will make firsthand observations of Nazi atrocities.

The legislators included Rep. Mott (R-Ore.).

Procedure for Rural Fire Districts Will Be Told

A representative of the state fire marshal's office will be called to Roseburg in the near future to meet with property owners of suburban areas to explain procedure in setting up rural fire districts, it was announced today. A petition bearing 94 names has been filed by residents of Edgewater asking that such meeting be held, and County Judge D. N. Busenbark has requested Glenn H. Taylor, Roseburg fire chief, to contact the state fire marshal and make arrangements for the meeting.

The speaker is expected to outline the laws authorizing protecting districts, offer information and advice on organization details and outline practices in other localities where such districts have been formed.
