A certificate of merit has been awarded to Captain Burton H. Laird, above, 909th field artillery battalion, 84th infantry division, United States army, in recognition of conspicuously meritorious and outstanding performance of military duty against the enemy in Germany and Belgium. The citation reads: As assistant S-3 during the period of the 10th of November 1944 to the 15th of January 1945, Captain Laird, working long hours without relief, displayed skill, efficiency and energy under adverse conditions in directing his unit's fire direction center which resulted in the delivery of accurate and effective artillery fire by his battalion.

Legion of Merit Citation Given to Capt. R. R. Murray

The Legion of Merit citation has been awarded to Captain Richard R. Murray, signal corps, according to word received in Roseburg by friends. His wife is the former Mary Holaday, teacher at Junior High school in Roseburg in 1939-41, and who later taught in Alaska, where she was married to Captain Murray in November 1942. At present she is residing at 728 West 19th street in Eugene while Captain Murray is on special assignment with the U. S. Military mission, Iranian army, Iran. Following his assignment in the Aleutian area, he was stationed successively in Missouri, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, and Philadelphia, and last October left for overseas duty.

The Legion of Merit citation reads as follows: "Captain Richard R. Murray, signal corps, for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services as officer in charge, Alaska communication system, from January, 1942 to July, 1943. Charged with the duty of constructing four fixed radio stations for the Alaskan defense command during the Aleutian campaign, Captain Murray with exceptional planning and technical knowledge, initiative and ingenuity completed his successive missions so satisfactorily that communications were immediately available upon the occupancy of the bases concerned. Faced with difficult problems of supply, transportation and severely unfavorable weather conditions, his determination and resourcefulness overcame all obstacles in improvising and substituting for missing and damaged equipment. His efforts contributed materially to the successful conclusion of the Aleutian campaign."

Multnomah Demos Plan To Block Registrar Act

PORTLAND, April 24. (AP)—Multnomah county democrats today began their statewide campaign to secure 14,442 signatures to petitions which would block the recent legislative act creating a county registrar of elections. Selection of John J. Wahl, Portland insurance man, as chairman of the drive was announced at a meeting of 200 democrats last night by County Chairman George Lavey. The petitions would refer the act to a vote in November, 1946.

Wahl charged the registrar bill was inspired by republicans to take election authority from the democratic county clerk, Al Brown. Wahl said that "for the first time in 60 years we elect a democratic clerk and these 50 men (in the legislature) want to ram this down our throat, disenfranchising the people."

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Air Medal Added to Decorations of Lt. Robert C. Snoddy for War Action

HUTCHINSON, Kas.—The Air Medal, awarded for meritorious acts while flying over enemy-held bases in the Pacific, has been presented to Lieutenant (jg) Robert C. Snoddy, USNR, above, a former News-Review employee, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Snoddy, 734 So. Pine St., Roseburg. His wife, Charlotte, resides at 116 So. Jackson, also in Roseburg. The citation, signed by Vice Admiral T. C. Kinkaid, commander of the Seventh fleet, recites the hazardous missions in which Lieutenant Snoddy participated between May and Sept. 1944.

Lieutenant Snoddy graduated from Roseburg High school in 1939 and later attended Oregon State college prior to being sworn into the navy at Seattle in July, 1942.

The award was made at Hutchinson, Kas., where Lt. Snoddy is undergoing training in navy Liberator bombers.

Lt. Snoddy was previously awarded the Purple Heart and the Commendation Ribbon. The citation accompanying the award reads: "For distinguishing himself by meritorious acts while participating in aerial flight. During the period from 28 May 1944 to 15 September 1944, he participated in twenty-nine combat missions, totaling 310.5 hours of flight, over enemy territory in the vicinity of operational enemy airfields, during which enemy opposition



was probable and expected. His actions have distinguished him among those performing duties of the same character."
