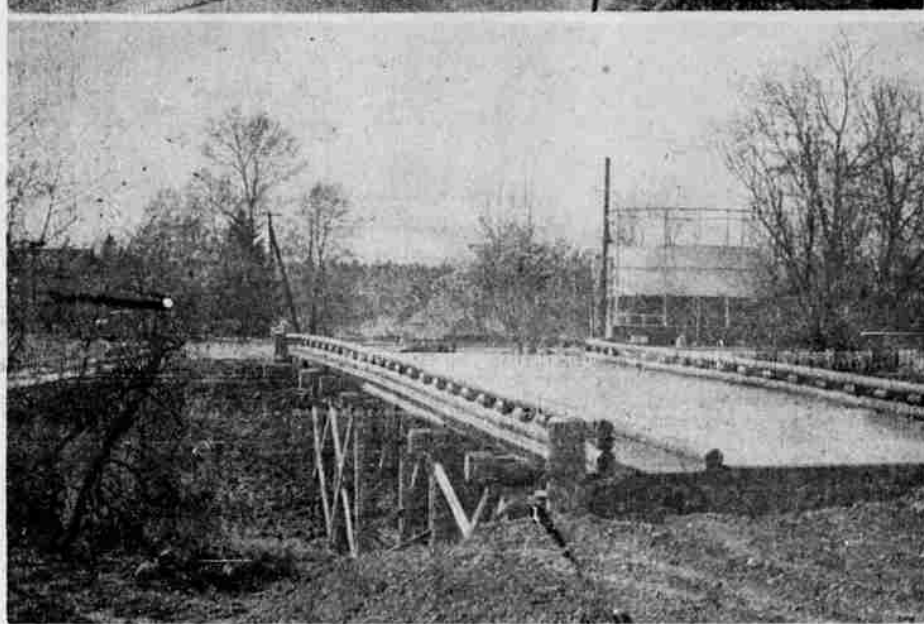
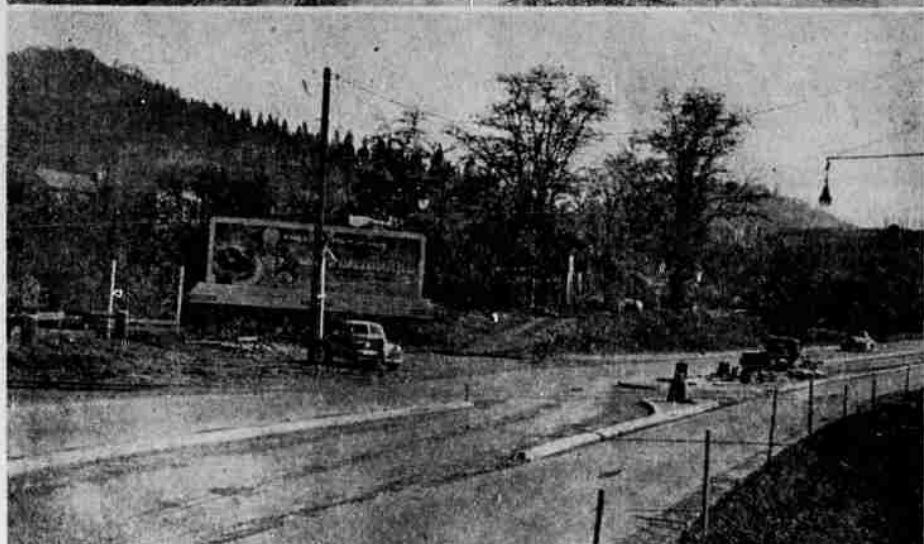
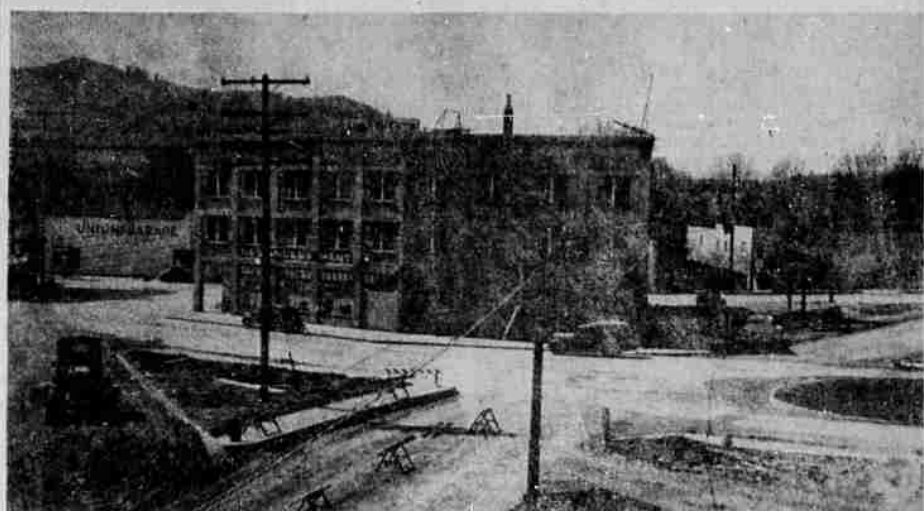
Potluck Supper Dated At Country Club

Camera Records Progress on Connection of Second Avenue South With Pacific Highway



Scenes above show the nature of the highway improvement now nearing completion in Roseburg where Second Avenue South—the city section of the North Umpqua highway—is being extended to the Pacific highway. Shown at top, looking west, is the Y extension of Second Avenue, the left fork connecting with the Pacific highway, while the right fork joins Winchester street. Center photo shows the traffic dividers being installed at the Deer Creek intersection. Similar installations are also being made at the junction of Winchester street with the Pacific highway. Lower photo shows the log bridge, now complete, across Deer Creek. Completion of the project will facilitate movement of heavy log traffic, and will shift log and piling trucks from the congested business area.
