Gasoline Ration Coupon Vendor Facing Trial

PORTLAND, April 26—(AP)—William Goepner today awaited return to Seattle for trial on a federal charge of offering to sell more than 3000 T-gasoline ration coupons.

He waived hearing when he appeared before U. S. Commissioner

Leedy yesterday. The government charges that at least one of the coupons allegedly in his possession was identified as burglarized from a Portland ration board. Coupons for 90,000 gallons were taken in the burglary.

State police and harbor patrolmen have made several attempts to recover a heavy metal object, thought possible the missing ration board safe, from the Tualatin river. A woman reported seeing several men leave a weighty object from an automobile the night after the robbery.
