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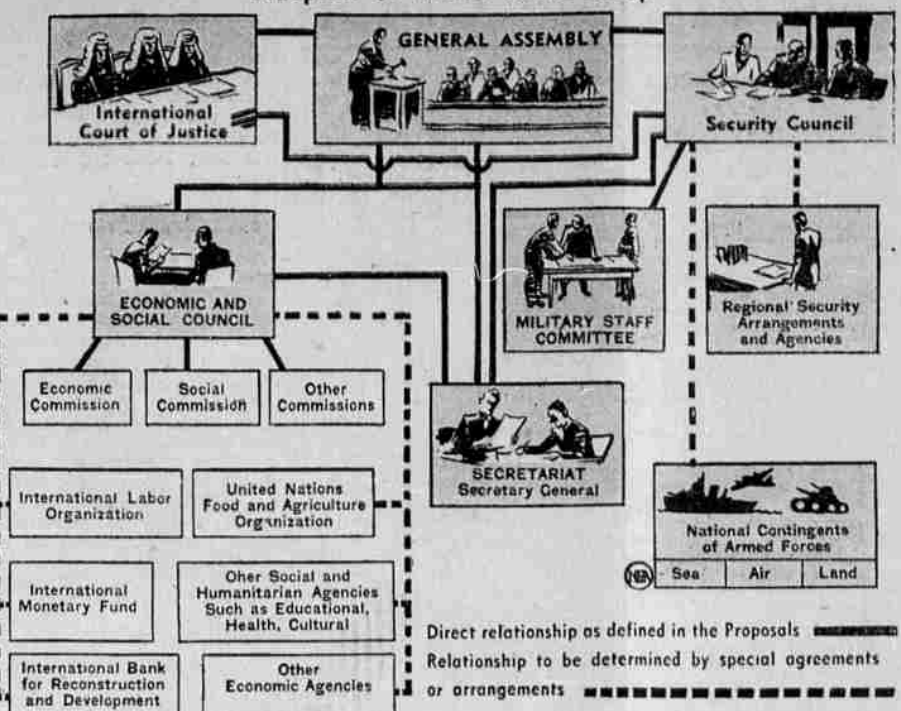
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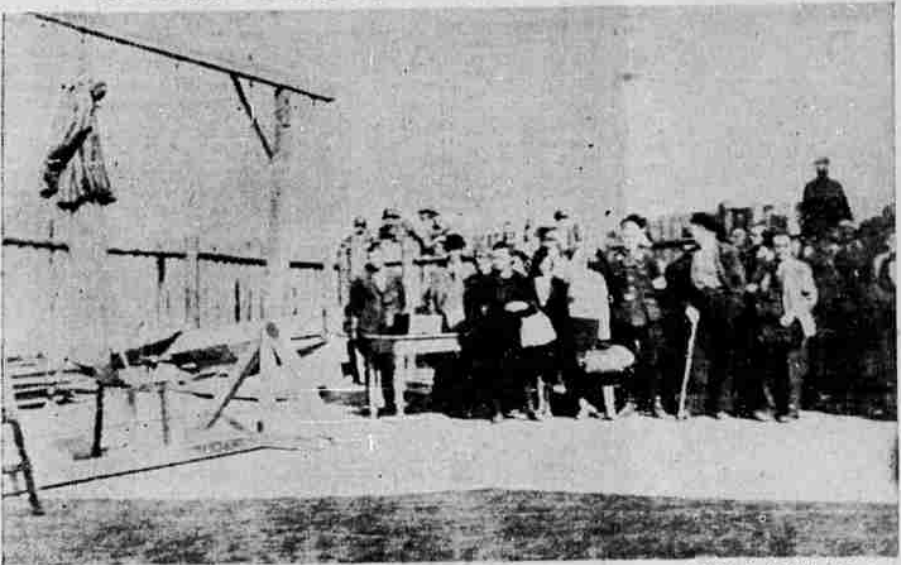
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Blueprint of World Peace Setup

Reminiscent Ex-Roseburger Admits Flaws in Narratives, Recounts Epic, Intercity Footrace at Grants Pass

This writer might be criticized for continually telling of the shortcomings of Grants Pass sport trainers and managers in the old field day sports between that city and Roseburg in and during the "Gay 90's," but we cannot help but "crow" a little over our successes in those days. Probably some one who was a resident of Grants Pass at that time can recall some of the things that were more favorable to that city, for I must admit that I am getting to that age when dates and names do not come to mind so readily.

A few weeks ago, when in Roseburg, Bill Buzzell of the county clerk's office corrected me on two counts in which I was in error. The first was the fact that I spoke of Fred Bonebrake as the footrace of those early days when, in fact, it was George Bonebrake. Fred was of the younger generation and was not in the running. But we must admit he was quite a fleet fellow afoot, although not in the game professionally.

Then again, Bill called to my attention that, in speaking of our first football team, I called it a high school team when, in fact, it was a grammar school team, as at that time there was no high school organized. I welcome these friendly corrections, as it helps greatly to keep the record straight.

Another "Feat" Recalled
I do hope that the Grants Pass citizens and press will pardon me if I relate another little incident when the Roseburg contingent again put it over on the "Passers" in their home town, during a 100-yard footrace.

During that era Grants Pass had a very promising footrace in young Fred Cheshire, who at that time was attending Oregon Agricultural college, now Oregon State college. He was the crack

sprinter of the college team, so Grants Pass thought they would have a walk-away in the event that year. But they did not count on the "cunning" of the Roseburg "sporting" fraternity.

When the 100-yard event was called that day in Grants Pass, the betting was strongly in favor of the home-town runners, who were two in number, Cheshire and another, whose name I believe was Childs. Roseburg entered four men in the race—Bonebrake, Bellows, Cochran and Green.

Green was the older head and captain of the team. Bonebrake was the fastest man on our squad and Cochran probably the slowest. Green, having been in the footrace game for a number of years, knew all the little things that would give the runner an advantage and just how to use them.

In drawing for positions, Cheshire drew the inside, or number one, position, with the Roseburg contestants in the next four positions and the other Grants Pass runner on the outside. This was not a maneuver, it was a lucky break, as it split the Grants Pass runners and placed them so they

were not able to help one another in any way, while the Roseburgers were placed together and able to advise or assist as the case might be.

Skull Work Triumphs
The runners took their positions. The starter, with gun in hand, stood a few feet in advance. When all was ready, the starter raised the gun over his head and, as he started to pull the trigger, one of the Roseburg runners was off the line like a shot with the rest all following. Naturally, the starter, seeing all the runners break and seeing that the first off had an advantage, did not pull the trigger, so it was a false start and all were called back to the line.

Seeing all in readiness, the starter repeated his performance, and this time another Roseburger "lumped the gun," the rest following in another false start. This continued various times with a different Roseburg runner making each break, while the rest broke slowly, taking their time and not exerting themselves. But the Grants Pass runners were both earnestly breaking fast on each start and were commencing to tire.

Finally one of the Grants Pass officials awakened to the strategy and ordered the starter to stand behind the line. Cochran was a quick starter and, from his position next to Childs, the latter being on the outside, was able to keep his eyes on the starter's trigger finger, and was able to start with the crack of the gun. Childs, after running a short distance was overtaking Cochran when he

stepped on a small piece of wood, which stuck to his spikes, forcing him to stop.

On the other side of the track Green, who was running next to Cheshire, was throwing his arms wildly while running close to the Grants Pass favorite, Cheshire was afraid to pass Green because of the flailing arms, and when he finally did break through it was too late and Cochran finished a few feet ahead of the Grants Pass contestant. Cochran was declared the winner, much to the disgust of the Grants Pass crowd and to young Cheshire himself.
