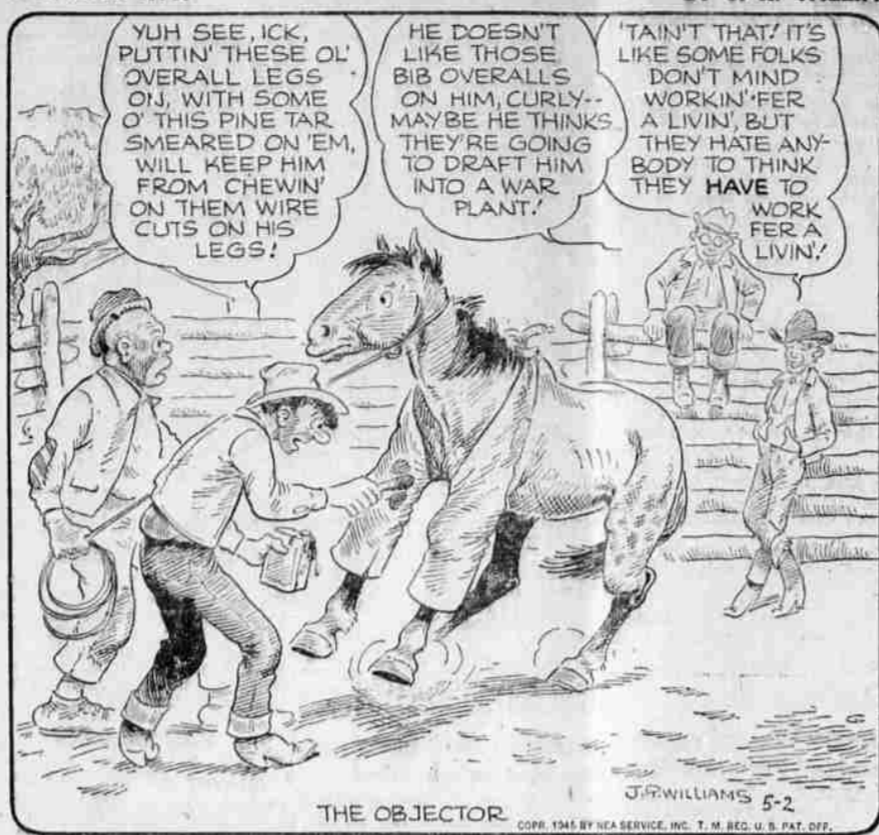
Annual Meeting Set by Roseburg Baptist Church

PROCESSED FOODS: Book 4—Blue stamps 12 through 22 valid through June 2. Blue stamps 23 through 32 valid through June 30. Blue stamps 33 through 42 valid through July 31. Blue stamps 43 through 52 valid through Aug. 31.
MEAT, BUTTER, CHEESE: Book 4—Red stamps 12 through 22 valid through June 2. Red stamps 23 through 32 valid through June 30. Red stamps 33 through 42 valid through July 31. Red stamps 43 through 52 valid through Aug. 31.
SUGAR: Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2. Sugar stamp 36 valid through June 30. Sugar stamp 37 valid through July 31. Sugar stamp 38 valid through Aug. 31.
SHOES: (Loose stamps invalid). Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid. New shoe stamp to become valid Aug. 1.
GASOLINE: (Coupons not valid unless endorsed). "A" 15 coupons, 4 gal. each, valid through June 31. "B" 4-7 valid, 5 gal. each. "C" 6-7 valid, 3 gal. each.
STOVES: Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.
WOOD, COAL, SAWDUST: Dealer determines delivery priority from consumer's written statement of annual needs and quantity on hand.
FLYING: Period 1-3 coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 90% of season's rations should have been used by date. Points and area: 100 in Roseburg area, and 75 in North Head. Must show ration card when flying.
