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## Ten Nationalities Represented in Boy Scout Troop

TEHERAN, Iran — Thousands of miles from home American soldiers are sponsoring a Boy Scout troop that comprises ten nationalities and half a dozen religious sects.

Fifty-four boys from 12 to 18 years old make up Troop 1, Teheran, the only troop in Iran accredited to the Boy Scouts of America.

The scoutmaster is a North Dakotan, T/S Samuel F. Skaff of Bismarck. Aiding him are five other GIs, a British corporal and two Presbyterian missionaries.

President Roosevelt was re-

sponsible for issuance of a BSA charter to the youngsters representing Iran, Iraq, the U. S. S. R., Palestine, Turkey, the United States, India, Lebanon, Czechoslovakia and Sweden. When the chief executive returned to the United States from the Teheran conference of December, 1943, he took with him a troop roster and sent the names to scout headquarters in New York. Two months later a charter was issued.

"The boys are being trained to be leaders," Skaff says. "After we go the troop must stand on its own collective feet. We'll try to leave behind the principles of real democratic ideals."

Scout week (Feb. 8 to 15) was celebrated this year in Teheran. A court of honor attended by the scouts' parents and friends was held, and 68 merit badges were distributed.

Mothers of the scouts, and local

tailors, made the uniforms. Khaki caps were obtained from the U. S. army's salvage department at cost. A coal bin in the basement of a mission building was turned into a meeting room with the aid of some army lumber, paint, soap and scrub brushes. Religion was no more a barrier than nationalities. Mohammedans, Protestants, Roman Catholics, Orthodox Catholics (Russian and Armenian), Jews and Zoroastrians scout side by side. All the boys speak English.

More Wire for Public

The wire has been classified as surplus.

## Salem Launches Pledge For Orderly VE-Day

SALEM, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—Salem leaders made sure today the city would not celebrate the end of the war in Europe by a parade or celebration.

Printed today were cards bearing the following words: "This is to certify that I wholeheartedly observed VE-day with a rededication to the unfinished

tasks remaining before us—by personally contributing blood, buying more bonds, or aiding in vital salvage. On to Tokyo."

The plans were made by officials of the city, schools, patriotic societies, ministers, civic organizations, press and radio.

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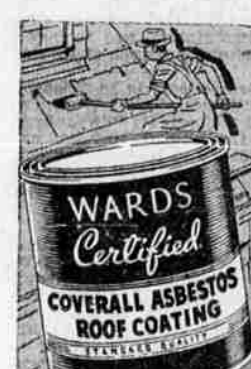

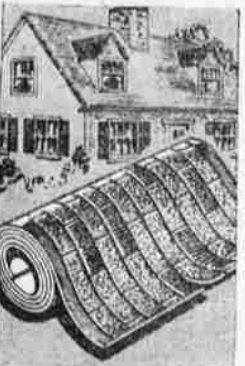


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
