

Sgt. Donald Wight In Flying Group Cited by President

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—Joining in the Eighth air force attack which slashed at enemy military and industrial installations stretching from the Rhine to Berlin, Sergeant Donald E. Wight, 21-year-old B-17 Flying Fortress radio operator and gunner, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Wight, of Tennesse, Ore., received his baptism by fire recently, when he flew through heavy flak to bomb key synthetic oil plants at Hamburg, Germany.

Before entering combat, Sgt. Wight, formerly engaged in farming, received advanced tactical training in England.

Sgt. Wight serves with the colorful 390th bombardment group cited by the president for skill and daring in action, and which shares in another presidential award for aiding in the Third air division's epic assault on key aircraft plants at Regensburg, Germany. The 390th holds a war record for the destruction of enemy aircraft by a lone group in a single engagement, having destroyed 63 German fighters over the Ruhr valley in Oct. 1943.

Truman Congratulates Allied Armies in Italy

WASHINGTON, May 2.—(AP)—President Truman today announced the unconditional surrender of German forces in Italy and said:

"Only folly and chaos can now delay the general capitulation everywhere of the German armies."

In a statement announcing he had sent congratulatory messages to the allied commanders, the president added:

"Let Japan as well as Germany understand the meaning of these events. Unless they are lost in fanaticism and are determined upon suicide they must recognize the meaning of the increasingly swifter moving power now ready for the capitulation or the destruction of the so recently arrogant enemies of mankind."

British Warships Land Troops in Rangoon Area

CALCUTTA, May 2.—(AP)—British warships have poured allied forces ashore on the Burma coast on both sides of Rangoon after initial parachute landing in the area, the southeast Asia command announced today.

At last reports other British troops driving down from the north toward the Burma capital were less than 36 miles from the city.

A communique announced that on Monday and Tuesday warships bombarded airfields on Car Nicobar, in the bay of Bengal, midway between the Andaman and the main Nicobar islands.

This strike was followed up by an air attack from aircraft carriers.

Later in the day a similar force attacked port installations at Port Blair.

Fish Expert Transferred To Oregon State College

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 2.—(AP)—Transfer of Dr. Frederic F. Fish, aquatic biologist for the U. S. fish and wild life service in Seattle, to Oregon State college experiment station was announced today.

Heroism Wins Bronze Star For Pvt. Dale A. Dyer, Also Holder of Purple Heart



PFC. Dale A. Dyer of the 119th Infantry has been awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in Belgium, according to word received by his wife, who has been furnished a copy of the citation. Mrs. Dyer resides at Myrtle Creek.

Pvt. Dyer, the citation states, was with a group defending a roadblock on Dec. 21, 1944. The enemy launched an attack consisting of five armored vehicles with supporting infantrymen. Hostile fire pinned down the group and heavy fire was placed in the area. At great risk to his life, Pvt. Dyer left his foxhole and advanced under fire to a position from which he could pour bullets on the attackers from his automatic rifle, permitting his comrades to withdraw to new defense positions.

Three days after the action for which he was awarded the Bronze Star, he was wounded with shrapnel and has received the Purple Heart. Previously, Oct. 15, 1944, he had suffered severe phosphorus burns and was hospitalized for a month.

Health System for Schools Discussed At Meeting Here

A workshop to discuss the new health and physical educational system to be introduced into the schools of Oregon was held at the Junior high school library April 27. Miss Helen Dempster, director of the Kellogg foundation, conducted the meeting and a talk was given by Rex Putnam, state

superintendent of public instruction. The health class, sponsored and directed by the Kellogg foundation, under the state department of education and taught by Mrs. Marion Ingram, registered nurse, of Roseburg, visited the workshop in the afternoon and gave a resume of their work which includes class work in health, personal care, home visits, assistance at health clinics in the public health office and outlying schools under the supervision of Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer; Mrs. Ethel Littler, public health nurse, and Mrs. Mary Barrett, county

health nurse; work at the hospital after school hours, and distribution of posters for the tuberculosis association. The health class is an accredited course listed among electives in the Senior High school. Those attending the meeting gave a report on the health and physical education program in their respective schools. At the meeting were Paul C. Elliott, city school superintendent; Omer Monger, Senior high school principal; Miss Margery Woglough, girls physical education instructor; and Mel Johnson, boys physical education instructor.
