## Oakland Replaces Seattle in Second Place in League

(By the Associated Press) The Oakland A's took over second place in the Pacific coast league this weekend, dropping the Seattle Rainiers to fourth as the unswerving Portland Beavers stretched their league lead to five full games.

The San Diego Padres continued unshaken in third place to round out the first division.

Hard hitting and tight pitching gave the A's three straight over Seattle Saturday and Sunday, 4-2, 12-2 and 5-1, while the Beavers slumped down the last place Hollywood Stars the same number of times by scores of 10-4, 7-6 and 10-0.

The A's had the advantage of three-hit pitching by Mann in the opener Sunday and of four-hit hurling by Hayes in the nightcap. The Rainiers helped their downfall along with eight errors.

At Hollywood the Beavers, cleaning up their series six games to one, Sunday had four-hit pitching from Tising in the 100th nightcap after Helsler had chalked up his fourth straight in winning the opener, 7-6.

The Padres split a pair of 11-inning contests with Los Angeles Saturday and Sunday, winning the first 5-4, while the Angels took the equally close Sunday opener, 2-1. In the Sunday nightcap, Kroevecik hit a two-run single in the seventh to give the San Diegans another 5-4 victory.

Fifth place Sacramento dropped its Saturday's game 5-8 to seventh place San Francisco and then swept the Sunday doubleheader, 15-7 and 11-1, principally through the stick work of Younker, who drove in nine runs in the two games.

## Kiser Decisions Katonen; Wagner Defeats Morelli

In the finale of a wrestling bill that opened with a five-man battle royal at the Roseburg armory last Saturday night, Jack Kiser was awarded a disputed decision over Paavo Katonen, after each man had won a fall and neither had gained a second one within the remainder of the half-hour time limit or in an extra session of five minutes.

Katonen captured the first fall in 19 minutes with his deadly back-to-back hammerman hold that suspended the victim off the mat by backward handslaps under his chin. In the second round lasting 18 minutes, the rugged Finn, with a 10-pound weight advantage, broke holds which would have subdued a matman of lesser cleverness and strength, but his antagonist finally succeeded with his legs where his arms failed. Four drop kicks softened Paavo sufficiently to pin him with a body press.

At the end of the third round of 13 minutes, with neither man having scored a fall, Referee Elton Owen expressed reluctance to pronounce a decision over the closely-contested combat. He turned this duty over to three judges selected at random from the spectators, and ordered the gladiators to battle an extra five minutes. No fall was scored. The judges unanimously declared for Kiser, to the shouted dissatisfaction of many of the fans, who thought the Finn had made the better showing.

**Wagner Beats Morelli**  
First man on the mat for the battle royal was George Dusette, and also the first man off of it for elimination from the card. This was at the end of a wild melee of 5 minutes, 10 seconds. Tony Morelli was ousted a minute and a half later and was followed in a half minute by "Georgie" George "Wagner. Paired
