Sgt. James Davidson Missing in Action

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Davidson, parents of Sgt. James R. Davidson, have received word from the War department that their son has been awarded the air medal. The citation reads as follows: "For meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight as armorer gunner of a B-25 type aircraft during an attack upon a railroad bridge at Piacenza, Italy, February 8, 1945. The professional skill and devotion to duty displayed by Sgt. Davidson reflect great credit upon himself and the military service of the United States."

This was Sgt. Davidson's first mission after landing in Corsica. On his next mission, Feb. 13, 1945 he was missing in action and nothing further has been heard of his whereabouts.

Beavers' Winning Streak Stopped; Race Tightened

Portland's six-game winning streak was stopped, Seattle inched ahead in its comeback drive and San Diego moved into a virtual tie with Oakland for second place in the Pacific coast league last night.

Victories by the Rainiers and Padres squeezed the first division into a tighter knot with only five games separating the first and fourth spot clubs.

The Beavers literally came apart at the seams in losing 10-1 at San Diego, committing four errors, two of which were made with the bases loaded. Pulford, Portland's usually reliable right-hander, was credited with the

loss. He was sent to the showers after giving up seven runs in the first four innings.

Seattle took a 7-3 decision at Sacramento, scoring four runs in the first inning off Fletcher, ace Solon hurler. The win failed to boost the Rainiers out of fourth place but moved them within half a game of San Diego and Oakland which are separated by three percentage points.

San Francisco defeated the Hollywood cellars 9-1. Joyce, star of the San Francisco mound staff,

turned in his best game of the season to chalk up his sixth victory.
