21 Miners Die in Utah Colliery Explosion

SUNNYSIDE, Utah, May 10.—(AP)—Twenty-one miners were killed when an explosion sprayed flames and gas through the Utah Fuel company's No. 1 mine in this central Utah coal digging center.

Two others were missing and believed dead. Seven injured were taken to hospitals. Three escaped injury.

Survivors attributed the blast to an accumulation of fine coal dust which exploded upon coming in contact with an electric spark.

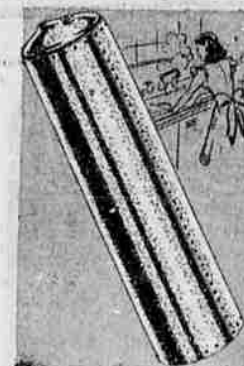

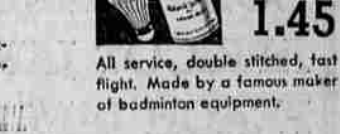
