NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE ALLIES
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 7th day of May, 1945, the following resolution was adopted:
RESOLVED, That the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve the Alley, Block 57 from the North line street paving on Mosher Street to the South line street paving on Lane Street, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:
First: By grading said Alley to the proper sub-grade.
Second: By paving the roadway of said Alley Seventeen feet Eight inches wide with concrete pavement.
Third: By constructing sub-drains.
Fourth: By constructing concrete curbs.
Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 7th day of May, 1945, which grade, plans, specifications are hereby approved and adopted.
The entire cost of said improvement includes engineering, interest, and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefitted thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City; and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefitted by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.
The estimates of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2,947.50.
Resolved that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, do and he is hereby directed to give notice of said improvement as provided by the Charter of said City.
Remonstrances against said proposed improvement must be filed in writing with the undersigned within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, which is the 10th day of May, 1945.
