

Port of Umpqua To Remove Shoals From Smith River

REEDSPORT — Immediate steps to remove shoals in Smith river will be taken by the Port of Umpqua commission, authority for the improvements having been granted at a commission meeting held at Reedport Monday. Smith river fishermen reported that shoals have blocked the channel at several points to such an extent that the mail boat, which also carries cream to market, is sometimes halted for several hours at low tide. Such delays, it was stated, might ruin cream during hot summer months. The commission arranged with the Umpqua River Transportation company to move necessary machinery to the Haskell and Long ranch bars to provide temporary channels pending procurement of a proper dredge to more effectively remove the shoals.

C. W. Wray reported completion of the port audit and will attend the regular meeting in June to give a full report.

A budget committee was named, consisting of O. S. Beckley, Drain; Fred Goodwin, Gardiner; Sid Samuelson, Reedport; E. D. Webb, Gardiner, and C. R. Elliott, Reedport.

Loading Dock Planned
A lease was granted the Bridge Lumber company of Reedport on property adjoining the millsite, the land to be used for lumber storage purposes. The company reported plans to construct a loading dock along the entire water front as soon as materials become available.

The commissioners gave approval to city ordinances for vacation of a short street near the high school, the land to be used for school purposes and for a street extension from L street to state highway 38 in the city of Reedport, to afford a connection to the railroad spur on the Umpqua river. The extension will provide an outlet for property on which the Reedport Cheese and Butter company proposes to construct a \$40,000 building as soon as possible.

Perry, the first member of the church by baptism; Miss Alice Mahan, missionary superintendent; Mrs. Louisa Kellems, Eugene, widow of one of the first ministers of the Roseburg church; Mrs. Ella Day, Eugene, one of the Sunday school superintendents in early days of the church, and C. F. Swander, Portland, state secretary.

The mortgage was burned by Elders F. L. Perry, A. K. Gibbs and H. B. Church.

The ceremony marked termination of a drive concluded on Easter Sunday during which the congregation raised more than

\$5,000 to retire the last of the indebtedness incurred in the construction of its present building.

WHAT V-E DAY MEANS.

To the poultryman and dairymen V-E day has not changed the picture for the next eight to twelve months to any great extent. There is still a severe shortage in meats of all kinds, which means that eggs and chicken meat will continue short, and prices should crowd ceilings at all times. The same will be true of dairy products, since they are not only short, but are also used as meat substitutes.

The difference at present is that poultry products call for no points, while dairy products do. However, it would not be surprising to hear of poultry and eggs being put on the point system. Also turkeys.

The whole business is certainly SNAFU. Reports are that there is a surplus of foods, but that OPA has gummed up the works. It makes little difference where the fault lies, as long as people are going hungry. The thing for the producer to do is to produce as much food as possible. For this year at least, he is almost certain to be well paid for it.

Whether or not there is a surplus, makes little difference, as Government agencies are taking everything they can get their mitts on. Thousands of tons of food in storage, but it's all Uncle's.

There is one very definite change due to V-E day, however, which must be borne in mind. According to all experts, transportation will shift to the west coast. Our feeds come largely from the Middle West. The railroads will be overloaded with war goods headed for the little yellow sons of heaven. Turkey feed and cow feed will take second place, if not third or fourth. So may we urge that you keep just a little ahead of your requirements all through the season. Try to keep at least two weeks supply of feed on hand always.

WHAT WE NEED.

More than anything else, we need a lot of oats and barley. In addition, we need a lot of those empty sacks you may have on hand to put oats and barley and other feed into. You may have seen our ads lately asking for all these things. If you haven't any of these things, but know of somebody who does have them, tell them about us.

HOW TO COOK TURKEYS.

Next November, ask us and we will tell you the best way to cook a turkey. But right now, we only want to say, "wait till next fall."

We have been waging a lone battle for years against too high temperatures in brooder houses. It is very gratifying nowadays to see so many people stressing the same ideas.

The last two we have noticed are "Norbest" News, and Doc, Billings of the Minnesota Turkey Department. Griffin in "Norbest" suggests about 90° at the hover edge and two inches above the floor. Doc says about 95° at the same spot, but warns against a tight "guard" to "teach them the heat."

These suggestions are so refreshing after all the dope ones put out by so many state experiment stations and brooder manufacturers. There "auto" be a law against anybody suggesting brooder temperatures of 100 or more, even if it is the manufacturer or a state or federal experiment station. Then to make it even more "dopey," they also advise using a tight "chick-guard" to teach them where the heat is.

The poor little chick or poul finds out darn quick where the heat is, and tries to get away. But the guard teaches him to stay close, and soon he is just as dopey as an OPA official. The sad part of it is, neither one ever gets entirely over it. We suggest that you give them enough heat for comfort, but give them a chance to get away from it if it gets oppressive.

FEED THE COW.

Grass is elegant now, and there is a tendency to ease up on dairy feed. But a heavy producing cow needs minerals and vitamins. Otherwise her production period will be shortened. With butterfat around 52c and extra payments of 10c to 15c, any good cow will not only pay for Umpqua Milkmaaker or OK Chop, but will make a big profit besides holding up a couple or three months longer in production. It always pays well to feed a good cow.

GREEN FEEDS.

Weather now should be ideal for planting green feed crops for pasture. Chickens, turkeys, cows, hogs or sheep. All will do better if green feed is available, and your cost of production will be lower. We like corn, sudan grass and sunflowers in that order, best. We have some local sudan that tests 95% germination.

ROOST 'EM EARLY.

A lot of diseases of turkeys and chickens would be avoided if the little ones were taught to roost early. They like to start at about three weeks and with encouragement will all be roosting by the time they are four weeks old. Don't worry that early roosting causes crooked breasts. It won't. It will help avoid disease.
