The Magnuson family had planned to come to Roseburg where they have many friends, but have decided they will first go to Terebonne, Ore., where Mrs. John Hansen, a daughter of Mr. Jaeger and a sister of Mrs. Magnuson, will take them to her farm home for a rest.

"I can't tell you what it meant to us to get all the mail we did and know so many people were thinking of and praying (we surely needed it) for us," Mrs. Magnuson writes in a letter to Mrs. Jaeger.
