UMPQUA AGATE SHOW IS HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL EVENT OF WEDNESDAY

The Umpqua Mineral Club held a highly successful agate and mineral show at the Woman's clubhouse on Wednesday night, May 9. About 40 members and guests were present to enjoy the display of beautiful and interesting materials collected from all parts of the Western hemisphere. Theo Bond presented an exhibit consisting principally of specimens from Central Oregon. Various types of lava were represented, including a beautiful display of obsidian, with Indian arrow and spearheads chipped from that glass-like substance. A sand spike from the Crater Lake region was only one of the extraordinary objects in this comprehensive collection.

Jack Wharton had a large table devoted to fossil leaf impressions, polished slabs of agate, mica, quartz, birdseye quartz, Australian opal, and thunder eggs or geodes. One large tray of thunder egg slabs was arranged with concealed lighting and made a very spectacular showing.

Alvin Knudson offered an exhibit of faceted gem stones which were extremely fascinating, especially to the ladies. Step-cut diamonds and topaz, cabochon jade and oriental catseye, green garnets and other precious stones vied with amethyst and tourmaline in the natural crystal form.

Roy Rose displayed agates of all types and descriptions, in polished slabs, shaped cabochons, and mounted sets. His plume agates drew exclamations of delight from all who viewed them. Beach agates, moss agates, picture agates and turtle-back agates were among those to be found on his table. One item of extreme oddity was a petrified giant shrimp. Only 12 of these objects have ever been found.

Everett Teater's table was a gathering spot for those who delight in jewelry. Rings, pendants, ear rings, tie sets, and bracelets set with a variety of stones, including agate, opal, turquoise, rhodonite, and rose quartz made up the bulk of his display. In addition there was a large case of stibite crystals, one of Mr. Teater's recent finds in the East Umpqua region.

Leslie Roberts, president of the club, presented a table of minerals and crystals in their natural form. All neatly mounted on glass bases and correctly labeled as to identity and place of origin, this display was an attraction to all. Some of the specimens were notable because of their great beauty; others, such as the magnatite, because of their peculiar characteristics. Magnatite will attract a steel needle at one end and repel it at the other. Mr. Roberts also showed his collection of fluorescent minerals which met with great approval. The majority of the fluorescent items came from New Jersey.
