Food Must Be Shared President Truman said "we must and can find a way" to share American food with "others so badly in need." Mr. Truman wrote in reply to a letter from Food for Freedom, Inc., asking him to see "for the sake of the future peace and security of this nation and of the world" that our food commitments abroad are fully kept. These commitments led to the sudden increase in point values for fats and oils. In announcing the boost, Price Administrator Bowles pointed to the recent re- port of the interagency committee on foreign shipments, which said this country must share its food supplies "to aid morale in the united nations and to prevent unrest and chaos in liberated countries." The committee declared that a "substantial adjustment" in the United States use of fats and oils would be necessary to meet the European deficit. Agencies in Conflict Chairman Thomas said the senate food investigating committee's majority report will call for designation of a food czar be- cause of what he termed a conflict of interest between OPA and WFA. Thomas contended that OPA, on the one hand, is responsible only for holding down prices and has no responsibility for produc- tion whereas WFA has the re- sponsibility for production and none for prices. Release of Three Top Metals to Consumers Dated

WASHINGTON, May 11 — (AP)—War Production board chairman J. A. Krug, unveiling a pattern for reconversion, announced today that three essential metals will be released for consumer goods July 1.

Manufacturers of civilian products will be able to obtain steel, copper and aluminum after that date without allotment orders, where delivery does not interfere with war production or priority consumer requirements.

Krug also announced special provisions to aid small manufacturers in acquiring supplies of the three metals. Applicable to those who produce less than \$50,000 in any quarter of the year, they also cover the needs of veterans and new enterprises in that category.

Limitations on the production of a small number of "hard goods" using large quantities of materials, such as automobiles, furniture, trucks, refrigerators and stoves, "will have to be retained until supply is free up a great deal more," Krug said.

"These orders generally will be amended to permit some production," he added.

The WPB chief said that of 420 control orders in effect April 1, 73 already have been revoked, "and it is expected that about half will have been revoked within the next few months."

He emphasized that pent-up demands for such programs as farm machinery, transportation and utilities will consume "a great deal of the material freed by the cut-backs."

near Davao gulf on Mindanao. Junction of the three U. S. divisions—the 40th to the north, 31st in the middle and 24th at the south—would cut this second largest Philippine island through the center and split the estimated 50,000 enemy troops garrisoned there.

On Tarakan island, off Borneo, Australian and Dutch invaders sent out extensive patrols after overrunning the oil fields. They encountered but few Japanese.

Despite bad weather bombers plastered Formosa factories and war installations and knocked out many parked aircraft.

MacArthur said targets were left "a mass of flame."

Patrol planes in raids from Formosa to the Dutch East Indies and the tip of Indo-China sank 15 freighters and five coastal vessels.
