State Mother For Oregon, 1945

Mrs. George R. Hyslop has been selected as the outstanding Mother of Oregon for 1945. The announcement was made by Mrs. George Moorhead, chairman of the committee designated by Governor Snell to select the Oregon Mother, in cooperation with the American Mothers Committee of the Golden Rule Foundation.

Age 60, Mrs. Hyslop was born at Columbus, Ohio, and is the mother of six children—three boys and three girls. They are: Major George L. Hyslop, who is at Field Headquarters in Chicago, Illinois. He holds a B. S. degree in Food Industries, with special work in frozen foods. He is a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity and was prominent in campus activities. He is also a graduate in advanced military training. Prior to his entrance into the army in December, 1941, he was employed as specialist in the frozen food plant of the R. D. Bode company, of Seattle, Washington.

Sgt. William W. Hyslop, now in overseas service. He holds a B. S. degree in business administration from Oregon State college. He is a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity and was active on the campus. Before he entered the army, William was a salesman for Zellerbach Paper company at Eugene, Oregon.

John J. Hyslop, O. M. 2/c—was a student in chemical engineering and left college in his junior year to enter the navy in 1943.

Susan is a graduate of Oregon State college in home economics. She also holds a master of science degree from New York university.

This was a scholarship granted for outstanding work in advertising at Oregon State college. While on the campus at Oregon State, Susan was active in dramatics, Associate Editor of the Barometer (College Daily), and Associated Editor of the Beaver (College annual). She is a member of Sigma Kappa sorority. Susan is married to Commander E. R. Duncan, USN, and lives in San Francisco, California.

Judy holds a B. S. degree in home economics. While on the campus she was very prominent in dramatics; is an alumnus of Pi Beta Phi sorority. She is married to William Belton who is First Vice Consul at the American Embassy at Ottawa, Canada. Mary holds a B. S. degree in business administration. She was Associate Editor of the Barometer and a member of Pi Beta Phi sorority. For the past six years she has been connected with the Home Owners Loan corporation in San Francisco. At present she is working for the American Red Cross.

Mrs. Hyslop is chairman of Red Cross committee, First Aid and Red Cross Home Nursing Certificate; member of the Presbyterian church and Sunday school teacher; president of the Corvallis Women's club; member of the D. A. R., Parent-Teachers Association; active in many civic and welfare organizations. The citation award and title, "Oregon State Mother for 1945" was awarded to Mrs. Hyslop by the governor during Mother's Day ceremonies under the direction of Mrs. Moorhead and her committee.

DR. CHARLES A. EDWARDS

"Alas and did my Saviour bleed and did my Saviour die" by Isaac Watts. Among the many hymns known as "old favorites," this hymn will undoubtedly receive numerous first choices. It first appeared in the foremost edition of "Hymns and Spiritual Songs" in 1707, and have the title "Godly Sorrow." Arising from the suffering of Christ, evangelists testify that this hymn has been the means of leading a multitude of penitents to the cross of Jesus Christ. Even the blind hymn writer, Fanny Crosby, witnesses to the fact that the singing of this hymn in a Methodist church in New York City in 1850 heralded for her a new spiritual enlightenment which she chose to call her conversion. These are her words: "After a prayer was offered they began to sing the grand old consecration hymn, 'Alas and did my Saviour bleed,' and when they came to the third line of the fifth stanza, 'Here Lord I give myself away,' my soul was flooded with celestial light and the joy of the Lord filled my soul." For over seventy years this blind singer wrote over two thousand hymns bringing joy and gladness to countless numbers of men and women filling their hearts with celestial light and joy and peace. — Amen.
