Hunger, Disease, Defiance Noted in German Problem

WITH AMERICAN OCCUPATION FORCES ON THE RHINE, May 15—(AP)—Three great enemies face the conqueror on German soil—hunger, disease and the unrepentant spirit of a warlike race.

In sharing the task of occupation with other allied powers, the United States indefinitely has committed armies totaling approximately 400,000 men. They may stay abroad until it becomes a political issue in the next presidential campaign; they may remain for a generation.

Long term occupation is regarded as a necessity by some high American officers "if we don't want another war in 20 years."

A vast stretch of the left bank of the Rhine is marked off with barbed wire behind which lies the equipment of two German armies. On the other side, German families picnic daily, looking at the scene across the river as though it was a light-hearted comedy.

All day long, beside the broad highways traveled by the hosts of the American army vehicles, German children smile and wave at the passing men in khaki. Some make the "V" sign.

At Lohelm, a boy of 12 was arrested for burying a pistol, ammunition and a bust of Hitler in his backyard.

Cologne and Essen are twin monuments of rubble to allied air power. The inhabitants hopefully sprinkle grass seeds on heaps of debris—if the grass grows it will keep down the summer dust.

Yet street cars are running again in Essen and the Krupp family interests are scheming how to get back to producing steel. And Cologne manufacturers are clamoring to reopen their repaired factories.

Paper Money No Spur
What the reichsmark is really worth is an economist's nightmare. The Americans carry marks that cost them ten cents each. In almost every town, regardless of size, the reichsbank is accepting deposits from Germans rich in paper money. So much paper money is floating about that some Germans don't care whether they work or not—at least when they are paid only by more paper.

The official allied standard for the German diet is 1,150 calories a day. It is difficult to enforce. At Roetgen the population struck against an order to turn in their surplus butter and eggs for redistribution by the allies. Many Germans are eating well. Famine may loom for the winter and one officer has predicted 4,000,000 Germans will starve in the Ruhr alone. But now they appear as undisturbed as fiddling grasshoppers.

The physical destruction in western Germany is not impressive. It is spectacular in numerous cases, but it is not the tearing out of a nation's vitals which the Ukrainians, for example, endured. Sullen dwellers in the basements of Cologne seem to regard their plight as unique. They apparently have no idea of what the wehrmacht did to Warsaw.

Oakland Girl Decorated For Military Efficiency

PFC Ann Malarsie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Boynston, Oakland, Ore., has been awarded the Good Conduct Medal for "exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity over a period of

one year or more." It was reported today from Fort Mason, Calif., where she is serving at the port of embarkation. She has been in military service since March 4, 1944. Award of the medal itself has been discontinued for the duration to conserve metal, but wearing of the appropriate ribbon is authorized.

Mrs. Louis L. Bodie Of Roseburg Passes

Mrs. Louis L. (Florence) Bodie, 85, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at her home yesterday following a prolonged period of illness. She was born at Sycamore, Illinois, November 16, 1859, and was married in that city to Louis L. Bodie June 24, 1886. Two children born to this union have preceded her in death. Mrs. Bodie came to Roseburg from Illinois about 35 years ago. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

She is survived by her husband, Louis L. Bodie, of Roseburg. Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Dr. Morris Roach of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the I. O. O. F. Cemetery.

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Oregon Dairy Alliance Drops Referendum Plan

PORTLAND, May 16.—(AP)—The Oregon Dairy alliance has abandoned its attempt to refer to the voters milk laws passed at the recent legislative session. Preliminary petitions had been filed against the measures, which become effective June 16. They

compel pasteurization of milk and milk products from herds chronically infected with Bang's disease or tuberculosis and permit the state director of agriculture to establish milk grades. The producer-distributor organization decided time was too short to obtain nearly 15,000 signatures necessary for a referendum.
