TO MEET FRIDAY**

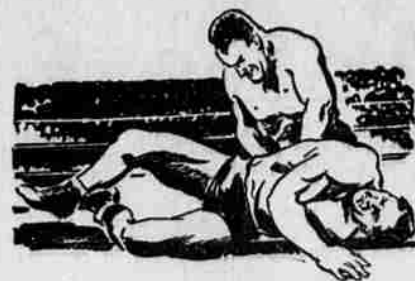
