Sutherland Gunner on Fortress Adds 4th Oak Leaf Cluster to Medal



BOMBER STATION, England — With more than two hundred combat hours as a ball turret gunner on an Eighth air force B-17 Flying Fortress, Staff Sergeant Robert L. Wood, 19, of Sutherlin, Ore., has been awarded the fourth Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement."

Sgt. Wood is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lafayette A. Wood, R. D. 1, Sutherlin. He joined the AAF in August, 1943.

Veteran of more than thirty of the Eighth air force's large scale bombing attacks on vital military and industrial targets in Nazi Germany, Sgt. Wood has participated in heavy bombardment missions over targets at such places as Berlin, Hanover, Hamburg, Merseburg and Bremen in Germany. Recalling his most memorable mission the gunner said, "The oil refinery at Magdeburg was a tough target for us. The flak was thick, and when we returned to our base we counted over seventy holes in our fort."

Sgt. Wood is a member of the 487th bomb group, a unit of the Third air division, cited by the president for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg in August, 1943.

Ex-Garden Valley Man Fine Naval Aide at 75

J. Edwin Page, a draftsman in the naval architect's office at the St. Johns River Shipbuilding company, Jacksonville, Fla., is setting an excellent record, despite the fact that he is 75 years of age, according to an article in "The Quarter Deck," company magazine, Page, who formerly resided in Garden Valley, has been with the Florida company for 31 months, and during that time has missed only one day.

Except for 14 years spent on his Garden Valley farm, Mr. Page has worked as a draftsman throughout all of his active life, his first work being with William Gibbs McAdoo on the construction of the Hudson river tunnel.

He left his farm at the outbreak of the war to return to his trade in order to contribute to the war effort.

Dr. Paul Graham Trueblood, Ph. D., professor of English in Stockton, Calif., junior college, is author of a new book, "The Flowering of Byron's Genius," just off the Stanford University Press. The book is a critique of Lord Byron's lengthy narrative poem, "Don Juan," and has as its thesis the constructive significance of Byron's social criticism in his great epic-satire, including his uncompromising denunciation of war. Dr. Trueblood wrote the book at the suggestion and under the guidance of Dr. Newman Ivey White, Duke university, an eminent scholar in the field of English romanticism.

U. S., Britain Agree on Poland, Stettinius Says

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17 — (AP) — Secretary of State Stettinius declared today there is "no question of any differences" between the American and British viewpoint on the formation of a new Polish coalition government. So far as is known to department officials here, there has not yet been any reply from Moscow on the demand of both the United States and Great Britain for a full explanation of the soviet arrest of 16 Poles who had gone to Moscow ostensibly to negotiate with the Russians over the formation of a new government.
