

Max Schmeling, Prisoner, Sneers At Louis' Name

PARIS, May 16 (AP)—Max Schmeling, former world heavyweight boxing champion who was reported several times to have been killed in the war, sneered at the mention of Joe Louis when he was seen in a prison camp, Stars and Stripes reported today.

The army newspaper said Maj. Clement Wheeler, USAF officer from San Antonio, Tex., talked with "der Maxie" for more than two hours recently when he visited a prison camp behind American lines to which Schmeling fled.

Wheeler said when he mentioned Joe Louis, the last world champion heavyweight and now a U. S. army sergeant, Schmeling sneered and left the impression that he considered the American Negro "just lucky" in knocking him out in their second match.

In a slap at American sports writers, Schmeling was quoted by Wheeler as saying:

"They never gave me a square deal in all the time I was in your country. Even when I won, they either said I was lucky or a big bum who could knock down a bigger bum. The only time they gave me any space in the papers was when (Jack) Sharkey fouled me."

That was how Schmeling won his title.

Back Injury Permanent

Wheeler said Schmeling told him he was "through for good" and that his career as a fighter ended when he jumped on Crete with German parachutists in 1942.

"I broke my back when I landed and almost died," Wheeler quoted Schmeling as saying. "I was in a hospital there for several months and finally pulled through, but my back will never be the same."

"Then I got back to Germany from that long time in the hospital and they let me out of the army."

"When you get home, if you ever do," Schmeling told Wheeler arrogantly, "be sure and tell the soft-living Yankees Max Schmeling is still alive. He doesn't die that easily. Perhaps he'll even make a trip to America so the people can see for themselves that he is all right."

Wheeler said he suggested that Schmeling's next voyage to the United States might be in irons and evoked a disdainful snort.

"He's a nazi through and through, no better than Hitler, Goering and the rest," Wheeler said Stars and Stripes. "Maybe he's even worse."

Oregon Lax in Care of Mentally Ill, Assertion

PORTLAND, May 16 (AP)—Oregon's record in care of its mentally ill was pointed out by E. B. MacNaughton, Portland banker and civic leader, before the Oregon Mental Hygiene society here.

He declared only three states spend less per mentally ill person. He put Oregon's figure at \$163, slightly higher during the

war, against a \$300 national average. Wisconsin's high is \$572.

MacNaughton said 1811 patients were admitted to the state's hospital last biennium but that only 97 were discharged and only 289 improved, "a lower rate than for better hospitals." He blamed lack of facilities, appropriations and personnel.

Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes or until thoroughly heated and cheese melted. Serves 6.

Toss together cut washed raw spinach, sliced radishes and sliced green onions with French dressing.
