Katonen Defeats Kiser; Hager Wins Over Sailor Hogan

Paavo Katonen, the Finnish bearcat, defeated Jack Kiser, holder of the Pacific northwest light-heavyweight championship, in a three-fall combat headlining the weekly wrestling program at the Roseburg armory last Saturday night. The rugged Finn's triumph, however, did not transfer the title because, at 182, he was four pounds over the class weight limit of 178. Kiser weighed in at 174.

The third and deciding fall of the match was taken by the Finn in a rapid-fire assault that lasted only 5 minutes 20 seconds. His deadly hangman hold, applied after a series of rabbit punches, head butts and near-strangling headlocks, put Kiser in a state of inertia on the mat. Paavo had taken the second fall in 13:58 with a pile-driver, a process by which the victim is upended from the rear and plunked head foremost on the mat with sufficient force to knock him cuckoo. Kiser managed to annex the opening fall in 12:45 with a sort of a full Nelson applied with his legs by stunting the Finn in a duel of body slams.

In the program opener, Tex Hager won a rough-and-tough three-fall tussle with Sailor Hogan that ended just 37 seconds under the overall time limit of one hour.

After each man had gained a fall, Hager scored the deciding one in an odd manner. Hogan had sent Hager to the canvas twice in quick succession with shoulder butts. On his third try he plunged his head squarely between Hager's upswung legs and, on the point of exhaustion, easily succumbed in that position to a scissors hold.

Church Activities At Reedsport Noted

REEDSPORT — For a number of years past Reedsport has been contented with a community church under Presbyterian domination, as far as the Protestant faith has been concerned. Now the local Baptists have severed their connection with the Community church and have set up a congregation of their own with the full support of the Oregon Baptist State convention. Recently Baptist ministers from Coos Bay, Roseburg and Ashland met here with the local communicants of that denomination and formed their new Reedsport Baptist church, holding their meetings for the present in the Rebekah hall.

For the present a minister will be supplied from Coos Bay but arrangements are soon to be made for a resident pastor to take charge. Methodists attend the well organized church at Gardiner, where also is the edifice of the Episcopal church, which has recently been raised from a mission to an organized mission church, with a local vestry in charge, and as soon as war conditions warrant, Bishop Darwell has announced a rector will be assigned to cover the district from Gardiner to Waldport, including Florence.

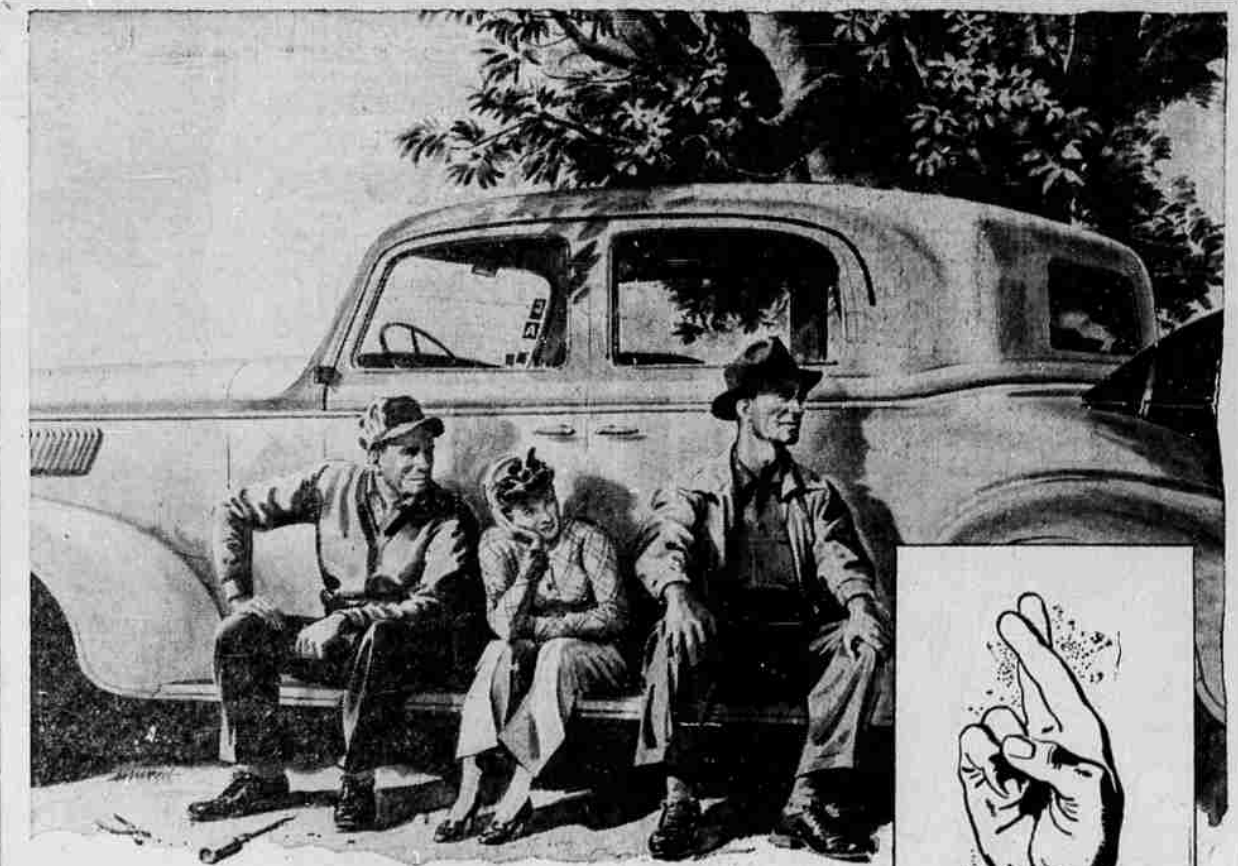
