Antone Leone' to Battle Hager in Mat Headliner

Tex Hager, known in professional wrestling circles as the "Creswell Cyclone" and a young mat artist who has been undefeated in several local appearances, will be featured in the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling show at the armory here next Saturday night.

Hager, who only a year ago wrestled Gorilla Ramus for the world lightweight title championship, will be given a serious contest against Antone Leone' (pronounced Leoney), a newcomer to Douglas county mat circles.

Hager was very impressive here last Saturday when he defeated Sailor Hogan in two out of three falls.

Leone', a French villain who hails from Oyster Bay, Long Island, N. Y., claims to be the "uncrowned king of wrestling villains" and has lived up to that reputation by winning four straight matches in Eugene. The gorilla-like meanie easterner has baffled most of the best wrestlers in the business with seemingly ineffective style based on one recognized hold—a reverse chinlock that is maneuvered into a back-breaker.

Leone', a headliner throughout the east before he invaded the Pacific coast about a month ago, is a colorful character. He will hold a slight weight advantage over the Lane county grappler, who will offset this advantage with speed and aggressiveness.

Owen promises an outstanding preliminary match, but will be unable to announce the principals until later in the week.

New Attorney General May Be Appointed Today

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—Attorney General Francis Biddle's early retirement from the Truman cabinet was indicated at the White House today.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said Mr. Truman would have an announcement this afternoon concerning Biddle, who submitted his resignation along with other hold-over Roosevelt cabinet members the night of April 12. This left little doubt that the president would disclose the appointment of a new attorney general this afternoon.

Ross declined to comment on a likely successor.

There has been speculation that Biddle will be offered an important diplomatic post, possibly in Paris.

Says Most of Next Draft To Be 18-year Age Class

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—An army officer predicted today that by fall youths turning 18 probably will be filling 85 per cent of draft calls.

Draft Director Gen. Hershey announced an indefinite deferment for all men 30 and over who stay in "useful" work. This, Hershey explained, results from the war's end in Europe and the services' need for younger men.

As has been the case with men 34 through 37, registrants 30 through 33 now need only be engaged in work that draft boards—inspired to be liberal-minded—consider important. They no longer are required to be "necessary men" as well to be eligible for occupational deferment.

Anti-Trust Suit Hits Glass Makers

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—The justice department filed an anti-trust suit today to strip the Pittsburgh Plate Glass company of its 100 warehouses and retail stores.

The department said its civil suit, filed in Toledo, Ohio, charges Pittsburgh Plate Glass, Pittsburgh, Pa., Libbey-Owens, Ford Glass company of Toledo, seven other glass manufacturers, 116 company officers and a trade association with conspiring to monopolize the production, processing, distribution and sale of flat glass. This includes plate, safety, window, tempered and sheet glass.

The complaint, the announcement said, alleges that in 1928 Pittsburgh and Libbey-Owens-Ford embarked on a program which has resulted in the "complete elimination of competition in the flat glass industry in the United States, through mergers, the purchasing of competing firms, institution of price wars, industrial agreements, control of patents, fixing prices, limiting production and by dividing sales territories."

Other measures were taken, the department said, to eliminate foreign competition.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—In the war bond drive to date, sales to individuals are \$1,849,000,000, of which \$1,246,000,000 is in series E bonds. Sales of securities to corporations won't enter the picture until June 18. Individual sales amount to 26 1/2 per cent of the \$7,000,000,000 quota. E bond sales are 31 per cent of quota. The drive started May 14 and ends June 30.

SUGAR: Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2. Sugar stamp 36 valid May 1 through Aug. 31.

Thos. Buckle, War Veteran, Passes

Thomas Charles Buckle, 68, well-known resident of Douglas county and Spanish-American War veteran, died Monday following a prolonged illness. He was born in London, England, Nov. 5, 1876, and came to Canada at the age of 14. Four years later he moved to Boston, Mass. He served in the Spanish American war and in the Philippine insurrection from 1899 to 1901. Following the war, he made his home in San Francisco until 1903, when he came to Oregon to make his home at Bandon. He was married at Coquille June 21, 1907, to Leona Jones. In 1928 he moved to Douglas county to make his home. He was a member of the Spanish American War Veterans and of the Church of God.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Leona Buckle, of Lookingglass, and nine children; George Buckle, Sweet Home, Oregon; Rev. Chas. Buckle, Gorman, Texas; Ivan Buckle, Kellogg, Idaho; Corporal Nelson Buckle, Langley field, Virginia; S-2c Edwin Buckle, U. S. navy, now in the south Pacific; Spencer Buckle, Roseburg; Harvey Buckle, Lookingglass; Mrs. Leona Ashford, Albany, Oregon.
