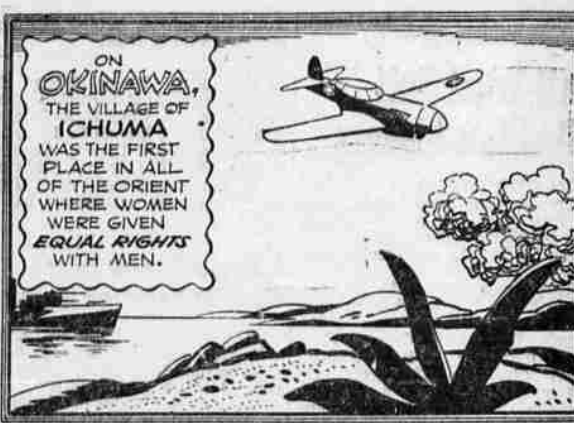
Veggs Beat Gas Bomb

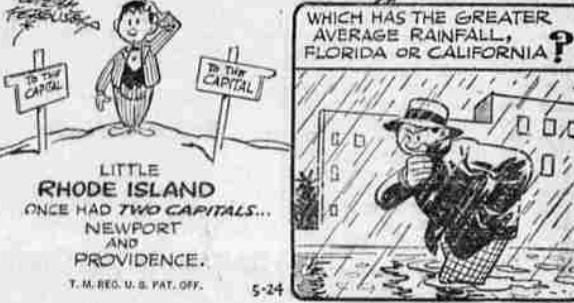
Dead Jap Provides Shoes for Filipino
