Completion of Farm Census in Douglas Planned

Mrs. R. B. Britton, assistant supervisor for census district No. 2, was in Roseburg from Eugene Wednesday making arrangements for completion of the farm census recently conducted in Douglas county.

Efforts have been made, she reports, to list census information covering all general farms, agricultural enterprises or establishments, even though small in area, including greenhouses, mushroom cellars, nurseries, hatcheries, keeping of cows or other livestock, chickens and other poultry, bees, growing of flowers, vegetables or fruits, where the value of products from such sources amounted to \$250 or more in 1944 and the area utilized is less than three acres.

In the event any farms or enterprises have not been included in the census it is urged that the operator notify the census bureau. A card or letter should be mailed giving the name, address, location of enterprise if different than the address of the operator. The notification should be mailed to Paul N. Plank, supervisor of census, Room 218, Lumberman's Exchange building, Eugene, Ore.

The census bureau is very anxious that no property be omitted from the enumeration and urges cooperation in listing any activities which may have been missed by enumerators. Mrs. Britton states.

elien Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, whose whereabouts remained as much of a mystery as the fate which overtook Adolf Hitler.

If Grand Admiral Doenitz or other members of the Flensburg government, who were arrested yesterday, know what has become of the last Nazi bludgeon still at large they kept the information to themselves.

Seven or eight of the nine cabinet ministers of Doenitz' "government" have been picked up by allied troops.

A report from the 21st army group said Adm. Gen. Hans Georg von Friedeburg committed suicide by poisoning after being arrested at Flensburg yesterday.

Ruthless Killer

Heinrich Himmler probably was the most sinister character produced by the Nazi movement.

As police chief for much of continental Europe in World War II, this bespectacled executioner was feared and hated by millions.

It was the cold-eyed Himmler who ordered the massacre of all residents of the Czech village of Lidice in reprisal for the assassination of his right hand aide, Reinhard Heydrich, in June, 1942. Thousands of Czechs were executed because of the death of "the butlerman" Heydrich.

In Germany he ran the Gestapo, the secret police organization which persecuted Jews and ruthlessly put down opposition to the Nazis. He instituted "mercy killings" in state institutions.
