D. A. R. REGENT AND SECRETARY ATTEND MEETING AT MEDFORD

Mrs. George M. Brown, regent of Umpqua chapter, D. A. R. and her secretary, Mrs. Walter V. Monger, represented Umpqua chapter at a meeting in Medford May 9 attended by chapter representatives from that city, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Coos Bay and Roseburg honoring the national president general, Mrs. Julius Young Talmadge. Mrs. Talmadge made three stops in Oregon to visit D. A. R. members en route home from the peace conference in San Francisco. More than 100 attended the luncheon at the Presbyterian church. A special table was arranged for regents of the various chapters and corsages were placed at each cover.

A number of national committee women were present as well as the state regent, Mrs. Lowry. The mayor of Medford extended a warm welcome to the first national president to visit that city. Music was followed by Mrs. Talmadge presenting her talk, in which she urged members particularly to keep informed on current legislation to let the boys in service realize that the American liberty and way of life will not be lost through so-called helpful laws and that the things the boys are fighting for will be safeguarded. She stated that eternal vigilance is still the price of freedom. She outlined the work accomplished by the Daughters and stated 13 million dollars worth of war bonds had been purchased and over \$150,000 given for war projects of the organization, which included car phones for all beds in one large hospital; mobile X-ray units on battleships and mobile trailer X-ray units for rural districts. She warned members not to allow the American school system, which she said was the best in the world, to be used for propaganda by foes within the regime—that this subversive element must not be allowed to steal the American heritage. She stated the foundation of America does not make progress by leaving it for substitutes or an internationalism and that the forefathers of this country had been fearful enough of this, to have

written the Bill of Rights. She spoke warmly of the two schools founded and financed by the Daughters for underprivileged children of the south. She stated the children of the D. A. R. raised over \$4000 for the enemy detector devices used on battleships. At the close of her talk, a beautiful myrtlewood salad bowl was presented to her and she closed her thank-you talk by stating "In my mind, I will see this bowl heaped up with the love of the Oregon Daughters." The luncheon was adjourned to an informal reception in the church parlors. Later the Crater Lake chapter took Mrs. Talmadge on a tour of historical places of interest in southern Oregon.

Picnic Postponed — The Town-son picnic, scheduled for Sunday, has been postponed until further notice, it was announced today.

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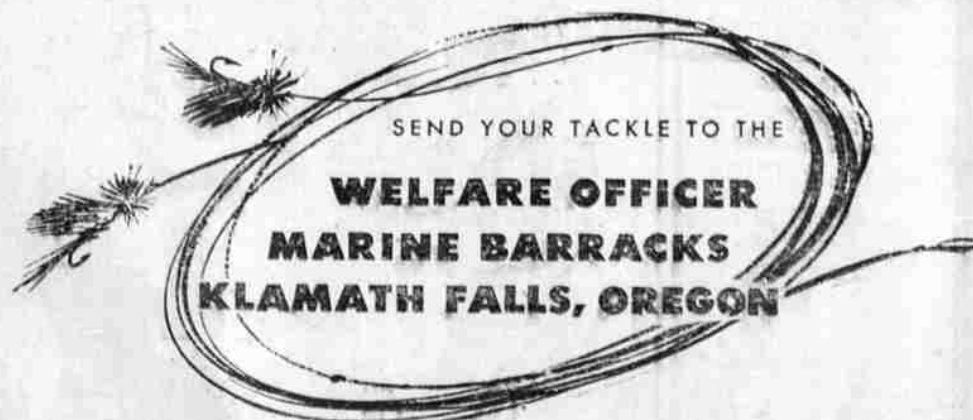
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
