

## Sgt. H. J. Willis Wins Silver Star For Battle Valor

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy—Staff Sergeant Hubert J. Willis of Roseburg, Oregon, recently was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action.

He is a member of the 86th Mountain Infantry regiment of the 10th Mountain division, which fought on the Fifth army front in Italy.

During a major attack upon fortified enemy, a squad leader was severely wounded and lay, unable to move, in a hazardous area about to become the center of a strategic artillery barrage. Willis left his protected position and maneuvered into the hail of small arms fire to reach the wounded man and carry him to safety.

Returning to his squad and finding the assistant squad leader was also a casualty, Willis organized and skillfully directed the squad in reducing the enemy emplacements.

The sergeant's mother, Mrs. Mable Maude Willis, lives at Lookingglass, Oregon.

## Trophy Credit Goes To Scout Council

A large share of the membership growth in region 11 of the Boy Scouts of America, which brought to the region the Lorillard Spencer trophy, is claimed by the Oregon Trail council, which had a 63 per cent increase in membership during 1944.

The regional growth was 28 per cent, representing the largest increase made by any of the 12 Boy Scout regions in the United States. The trophy, which was presented to Alton F. Baker of Eugene, a member of the national Boy Scout council, this week is a large silver pitcher presented to the Boy Scouts of America four years ago by Mrs. Lorillard Spencer, Sr., of New York as a trophy in honor of her son who

was a member of the national executive board of the Boy Scouts of America and president and commissioner of New York City scouting in its early days.

Greatest increase in the local Boy Scout council which covers six counties in western Oregon was in the cubbing program for boys, 8, 10 and 11 years of age. The increase in cubs was 109 per cent during 1944, and the increase in cub leaders was 135 per cent.

## "Haunted House" at Boy Scout Camp Razed

The famous "haunted house" at Camp Lucky Boy has been destroyed.

Object of many campfire stories, the "house," located about a half mile west of the Boy Scout summer camp on Blue River, was razed sometime recently, for some unknown reason.

For twenty years Boy Scouts attending Camp Lucky Boy have heard stories about the "haunted house" and its connection with the "old homestead" which is located on camp property. Built partly from hand-hewn lumber, the two small buildings were explored often by the scout campers.

Whether the "haunted house" story will be continued during Camp Lucky Boy-1945, which opens June 24 for nine weeks, will be determined by the camp staff and the scout campers themselves, it was announced.

## 41st Division's Medics Forced to Tackle Tough Jobs

WITH THE 41ST DIVISION AT JOLO CITY, Philippines, (Delayed)—(AP)—Capt. R. H. Ludden, Viroqua, Wis., looked thoughtfully at the litter case be-

ing carried into the emergency hospital of this Jolo capital. It was a woman.

The commanding officer of the 2nd platoon, 118th clearing company, said "I hope that's not a maternity case, none of our boys has tackled anything like that as yet. They might not know how to take it."

"Our boys"—medics with two years of combat duty in New Guinea, and only GIs to worry about—are now running a civil-

ian hospital. It is the first time, says Captain Ludden, an army medical unit has been given such an assignment in the Pacific.

It came about when the 41st division troops, to which the 118th has been attached since early 1942, came ashore on Jolo, April 9, and found the city a battered pulp with an acute hospitalization problem.

During the three years of Japanese occupation, Jolo's people received little medical attention.

Malaria, yaws, beriberi, tropical ulcers and even leprosy went unattended.

It was tough for a time, said Sgt. Ray Resnick of Arlington, Wash., to straighten up GI slang in the presence of Filipino women who understand English.

The "hospital" is a former public school building with the surgery set up in the chemical laboratory.

On the eighth day of occupancy the Japs shelled the hospital

killing one enlisted medic and four civilians and wounding 15 Filipinos.

Pvt. Joseph Newton, Springfield, Mo., ignored the shelling and ran out and rounded up paric-stricken patients who had fled their cots.

Busiest man in the outfit since D-day has been Corp. Tom Coleman, of Omaha, Wash., who handled about 200 patients a day at the dispensary during April.

AZALEA—Mrs. T. C. Johns has received a letter from her son, Tech/5 Darwin T. Johns, saying he has been liberated from a German prison camp and is in a hospital in France. He has been a prisoner of the Germans since February 18, 1943, when he was captured during the battle of the Kraemer pass in North Africa.

### Fresh Pineapple

Prepare by peeling, "eyeing" and coring. Pack into clean jars, cover with hot syrup, using a thin or medium or heavy syrup (thin syrup, 1 cup sugar to 2 cups water; medium, 1 1/2 cups sugar to 2 cups water; heavy, 2 cups sugar to 2 cups water) to within 1 inch of top of jar. Adjust lids to jars according to type used, seal self-sealing lids. Process in hot water bath for 20 minutes for quarts, counting time after the water to the top of the jars starts to boil. Or, process in a pressure cooker for 10 minutes at 5 pounds pressure. Tighten lids of all but self-sealing jars after processing is finished. Do not invert jars to cool.
