Legion Auxiliary To Sell Poppies in City Tomorrow

Poppies to honor America's dead warriors two World wars will be worn in Roseburg on Saturday, May 26, Vera McClintock Jones, president of Umpqua unit of the American Legion auxiliary, announced today.

The little red flowers will pay tribute both to those men who have died for their country in the present war and to those who fell 27 years ago in France and Belgium among the availing poppies. The money received for the flowers will be used to aid the disabled veterans of both wars and their families.

Extensive preparations for the observance of Poppy day were made by Umpqua unit of the auxiliary under the leadership of Myrtle Baker, unit poppy chairman. Everyone in the city will be able to buy the flowers of remembrance from the many volunteer workers from the auxiliary, who will be on the streets all through the day.

The flowers are made of crepe paper on the pattern of the wild poppy of Flanders. They were ordered from the Veterans facility, where disabled veterans made them under the direction of the rehabilitation department of the auxiliary. Making the poppies has helped these veterans keep their minds and fingers occupied, causing the otherwise tedious months to pass quickly and at the same time furnishing the men with a means of livelihood.

This year it is expected that more Americans than ever before will wish to wear the poppies as a salute to the dead soldiers and their bereaved families, and as a financial aid to the living but disabled soldiers and their needy families, Mrs. Jones states.

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Incidents Attending Institution of Roseburg Elks Lodge Recalled by Banquet Aide, Contemporary Scribe

The announcement that the Roseburg lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks is at last free from debt and will celebrate retirement of bonds Saturday night, marks more than a milestone in the history of Roseburg fraternities.

Their majestic building today stands upon city lots which were once the evening playgrounds of Roseburg youths who gathered upon the spot in the heart of old Roseburg and played their games until darkness drove them indoors. It also was the site where small shows sometimes pitched their tents for a week's stand of "Ten Nights in a Bar Room," "Uncle Tom's Cabin," and other dramatic classics in the days before Roseburg had a real theater. There were also held the outdoor shows of travelling medicine men and tight-rope and trapeze performers. And when the Oregon troops returned home from the Spanish-American war, and the light in the Philippines, the Second Oregon regiment was given an outdoor supper, prepared and served by the women of Roseburg, on these lots.

The Elks took over the property and erected their first building on the southern end of the lot. The lodge room occupied the top story, and the lower, or ground floor, became the drill room of the Oregon National guard company. Later the club rooms were added.

As I recall events Fred Page Tustin, a lawyer who came from Alaska and settled in Roseburg, was the prime mover in instituting the Roseburg lodge. Tustin had belonged to the order for some time and felt the need for a lodge in Roseburg. I can't remember who was associated with him in the enterprise, but very soon the movement gained headway and the lodge was ready for institution. Preparations were made for the event and on the morning of the ceremonial, large delegations arrived by train from Portland, Salem, Albany and Eugene. The Roseburg delegation greeted the visitors at the depot. Tustin acted as grand marshal, and formed a parade from the depot to the old McCellan hotel, where breakfast was served.

En route, Tustin halted the marching group at various places, pointing out different locations of buildings and landmarks. He pointed out the I. O. O. F. hall, where the institution ceremony

was held, and the theater room on the lower floor, where the banquet was served later in the day. He paused with the group in front of the Senate saloon in the old Abraham building, stating that the operator was to become a member of the lodge; and at the Elite in the Caro building, which was marked as B. P. O. E. headquarters, and also at the Roseleaf Cigar store in the same building; but he allowed no one to break line until the hotel was reached and breakfast served.

How different in personal appearance was that group of Elks from those of today; for then nearly every man wore either a beard or a heavy mustache. Looking over a picture which I possess of that Elks banquet, I can remember only two of the Roseburg members who were without facial adornment. Charles Curry and Sam Sykes were smooth shaven and possibly Claude Cannon, but I believe Claude did wear a mustache. Hermann Marks also may have been smooth shaven. A few visitors were without whiskers or mustache.

At this banquet, which was held about midnight, after the lodge ceremony and initiation, Silas Dilly, a heavily mustached individual, was head waiter. John Moffitt and George Grubb also were mustached waiters, and I believe that Ed Carlson, also a waiter, had a small, light-colored mustache. "Be" McCurdy, John Warts and myself were three waiters without hirsute adornment. John McCurdy, who presided over the side bar, wore a very heavy pair of handle bars.

The banquet was a real bang-up affair, with fiery speeches, music by the orchestra, and a lot of group singing, and lasted into the small hours of the morning. I think that Lark Bilyeu of Eugene was the principal speaker and Tustin was toastmaster.

As I remember it, it was a grand and glorious event, but in all, a very orderly affair for those days.

Elected first exalted ruler of the lodge (You guessed it correctly): Fred Page Tustin.
