PORTLAND, May 28.—(AP)—Oregon's four top democratic leaders have recommended Elton Watkins, ex-congressman and former assistant U. S. district attorney, for United States district attorney in this state, National Committee Chairman Lew Wallace said today.

The third term of District Attorney Carl C. Donahue will expire July 23, Wallace said. "Donahue's a fine citizen," Wallace declared, "but I think these jobs should be passed around. I feel he has been amply paid for any service he has rendered the party." Donahue is the first man to hold the U. S. district attorneyship in Oregon for 12 years.

Watkins, a congressman from Oregon's 3rd district in 1923-25, was an unsuccessful senatorial candidate in 1930.

Wife of Marine Missing After Leaving K-Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—Efforts are being made to trace the whereabouts of Virginia Jean Harrell, 19-year-old marine wife, who failed to arrive on schedule in Los Angeles after leaving here by bus last Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Harrell was scheduled to arrive at the southern city Thursday evening. When she failed to do so, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Aldrich, notified her husband, Cpl. Edward Harrell of the marine barracks here. Chaplain Gilmer of the barracks, who is helping Cpl. Harrell in the attempt to locate Mrs. Harrell, said the young girl left here anxious to get home to her small baby left in the care of her parents.

Wallet Over Heart Stops Bullet of Jap Sniper

LUZON, May 28.—(AP)—Capt. William "Stretch" Morgan, Sioux Falls, S. D., returned to duty after two months in the hospital recovering from a wound. He drew his pay and stack 800 pesos in bills in his wallet. A short time later while the 6-foot 5-inch officer was talking with a platoon leader over a walkie-talkie when a Jap sniper's bullet grazed his arm and embedded itself in the 800 pesos in the wallet which was in a pocket over his heart.

Flier Tempted to Dump Goering Out of Plane

MULLAN, Idaho, May 28.—(AP)—A U. S. pilot who flew Reichsmarshal Goering to his capture with allied chiefs after his capture wrote his wife here that he was sorely tempted to jettison his pompous cargo in midair. Capt. M. Y. Foster, pilot of the plane in which Goering traveled, said his "rather effeminate" passenger "gave me the creeps." "I don't know quite what to think of it yet," he wrote. "You can imagine how it seemed up there with that big, fat ape pointing out Munich and such places along the route. Several times I had an impulse to turn the plane over and see if I could shake him out, but he was wedged in like a champagne cork."

Truman Urges Wider Span of Jobless Pay

ure of economic security for the workers." The maximum rate of \$15 to \$18 a week fixed by most states, he asserted, "is clearly inadequate to protect unemployed workers against ruthless cuts in living standards, particularly if they have families."

Would Widen Brackets—I am confident that, with appropriate measures, we can avoid large scale and lengthy unemployment during the transition period," Mr. Truman wrote. "However, some temporary unemployment is unavoidable, particularly when total demobilization becomes possible."

Specifically the president proposed that congress, during the emergency period, extend the coverage of unemployment compensation to include federal employees, maritime workers, and other workers not now insured. He recommended that they be financed entirely by the federal government during the emergency, and that the benefits should "appropriately be administered by the states."

The president also recommended that congress provide, through supplementary emergency benefit payments, minimum standards for the weekly rate and duration of unemployment benefits.

Less than Third of Freed Japs Return to West

TOPAZ, Utah, May 28.—(AP)—Slightly less than one-third of the Japanese leaving the 10 U. S. relocation centers are returning to the west coast, Ray B. Haight, acting area supervisor of the War Relocation authority, said yesterday.

Of 7,352 Japanese Americans who have taken advantage of the lifting of the exclusion ban, but 2,353 have gone to the west coast. The east has attracted 3,206. Few, he said, are remaining near the relocation centers.
