British War Casualties Reported by Churchill
LONDON, May 29 (AP)—Prime minister Churchill announced today that the British empire armed forces had suffered 1,128,315 casualties during the war, including 307,201 killed. The reported death toll for the 66 months of the war was only a little more than a third as large as that of the British empire in the 52 months of the first world war. In reporting to commons, Churchill said that additional losses were inflicted upon the civilian population of Britain by enemy bombardment. He said civilian casualties totaled 60,585 killed, 86,175 seriously injured and upwards of 150,000 slightly injured.

New Insect Killer to Battle Potato Beetle
WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—DDT, the war-developed insect killer, will be used commercially for the first time against the potato tuber flea beetle in Oregon. The War Production board announced today it had made available a limited quantity of DDT. Its use against the potato beetle is restricted to Oregon because that is the only area where severe damage to the tuber cannot be prevented by materials used elsewhere, WPB said.

Circuit Court At End as Jury Takes Suit for Damages
The May term of circuit court came to an abrupt end today after the case of L. R. Chambers vs. J. F. Dillard of the Dillard Motor company, had been submitted to the jury. The jury still was deliberating at an early hour this afternoon. The suit was one in which Chambers claimed damages for an automobile stolen from the Dillard Motor company lot, where it had been serviced. The defense denied responsibility for the theft of the automobile and the damage subsequently suffered when the machine was wrecked.

Jack Teagarden's Orchestra Tops in Recording, Films
No bandleader is billed prominently on so many record labels as Jack Teagarden, who brings his orchestra to Roseburg Wednesday May 30, through arrangements with Music Corporation of America. As star trombonist and vocalist with Benn Pollack and Paul Whiteman, he was on all of their records, of course; he also made innumerable blatters for other record companies with house and studio orchestras. When Teagarden organized his own orchestra, Columbia signed him up, but he was such a good recording name that Varsity, when it was started, lured him away. Varsity was a short-lived recording venture, but that didn't affect Teagarden. Decca signed his band the moment it was available. In the meantime, he was a feature of Metronome magazine's "All-Star" poll-winner records in '39, '40, and '41, which put him on the Victor label, too. Then he was signed for the Bing Crosby picture at Paramount, "The Birth of the Blues," and made discs for Decca with Bing and Mary Martin as well as on his own, Standard Transcription in Hollywood. He bought his band for a series program for over three hundred radio stations, and a regular Teagarden recording boom developed. It was paralleled at box-offices, with new attendance and receipt marks at the Casa Manana in Los Angeles, Jantzen's beach in Portland, the Plantation club in Dallas, and Peabody hotel in Memphis in swift succession.
