Proposed City Budget Boosted by Committee

\$30,000 will be applied against the forthcoming budget as estimated cash on hand.

In preparing the 1945-46 budget the committee rejected requests for salary increases, except in secondary positions, a small advance being given the assistant fire chief, and a new job of assistant street superintendent being created with a salary of \$2050 per year. The sum of \$600 was allowed, in addition to the usual item for auditing, to provide for a monthly audit of city financial records and a report to the council.

An additional fire truck driver was authorized at a salary of \$1,500 per year, and the allowance to volunteer firemen was upped from \$1500 to \$1800.

In the way of city improvements, the committee will recommend construction of municipal rest rooms at the playground opposite the Elks lodge hall at an estimated cost of \$3,500, and included \$3,000 to be used in building a machinery shed for the street department. The sum of \$5,000 was recommended for the city recreation fund.

The committee will submit its final report and recommendations at the regular meeting of the city council to be held June 4.

predicted success in this endeavor.

Syrian, French Clash

Stettinius spoke by radio last night to Americans at home and the armed forces abroad. Even as he talked, reports came of armed clashes between French troops and Arabs in the former French mandate of Syria, now independent. London said British troops might have to restore order.

The relative roles of France and Britain in the Middle East appeared to be in question. In Moscow and London, Harry Hopkins and Joseph E. Davies, as special envoys of President Truman, explored the possible accomplishments of an expected Big-Three meeting. The goal is a key to the Polish puzzle and settlement of other conflicts of big-power interest in eastern Europe. Objectives Summarized

Secretary Stettinius made these chief points:

1. Major considerations of American foreign policy are to render Germany and Japan forever harmless, to extend allied unity, to help establish international justice and fair dealing, to advance world social and economic conditions as essentials of peace, and finally to realize that "we in America can never again turn our backs upon the world."
2. The United States must maintain its worldwide interests in its relations with the other great powers and "we must mediate between them when their interests conflict among themselves."
3. It is the American purpose to try constantly for greater unity among the powers. Stettinius added pointedly, "we have the right to expect the same spirit and the same approach on the part of our great allies." He made this comment in a discussion of relations with Russia, which he deliberately singled out from all other American relations by asserting that the desire for unity "is as true of our relations with the Soviet Union" as

it is of those with Britain, China and France. Recently, because of the Polish issue, the United States had moved closer to Britain and in opposition to Russia. The indicated desire now is to get back into a middle position.

Reserve on Argentina

4. In backing admission of Argentina to the United Nations conference—which Russia battled all the way—the United States did not give "a blanket endorsement of the policies of the Argentine government... with many of these policies both the government and people of the United States have no sympathy."

5. For a solution of the Polish problem the United States intends "to exert all its influence in collaboration with the Soviet Union and Great Britain, toward fulfillment of the Yalta agreement."

6. Trusteeship arrangements for the supervision of dependent peoples under international control have been worked out so that they would assure to the United States control of strategic Pacific islands. (This is in line with the demands of powerful senatorial and army-navy groups.)

In his review of conference accomplishments Stettinius made it quite clear that he has no doubt a world organization will be turned out here early in June, but whether it will really preserve peace depends on whether the peoples of the world are determined to make it work.

ward from Shuri, the fortress garrison strongly resisted pressure from the Sixth Marines and the 77th and 96th Infantry divisions.

The Sixth Marines twice gained the crest of Wana ridge, a half mile north, and both times were forced back by Japanese attack line with satchel charges thrown from long poles whirled slingshot-fashion over their heads.

Two Jima-based army Mustangs, meanwhile, struck the Kasumi-Gaura naval air station, 30 miles northeast of Tokyo, strafing parked planes and installations. Forty-two Japanese planes were destroyed or damaged. One Mustang was lost.

Fires Sweep Yokohama After Attack by B-29s

Served an official estimate of damage from today's mass raid until post-strike photographs have been studied. But returning airmen said fire bombs were dropped with concentrated precision in clear weather and left "black after black" in flames.

Superforts have unloaded 11,700

tons of fire-bombs in their last three strikes, involving 1,500 sorties, seeking to paralyze the heart of Japan's war industry.

Victims of last Saturday's great Superfortress fire raid on Tokyo have been allocated 50,444,000 yen (slightly less than \$13,000,000 at prewar exchange rates), Domei news agency reported today in a broadcast.

City Vital Spot of Japan
Yokohama, Japan's fifth largest city, is Tokyo's port. It handled 25 per cent of Japan's prewar foreign trade.

Today's prime targets were: 1. Yokohama's waterfront with its vital piers, docks and breakwaters. Also in the area are shipbuilding, aircraft, electrical and communications equipment plants.

2. Modern commercial and residential districts in southeastern Yokohama, where the population is about 30,000 per square mile. The city, with 72 square miles area, has 1,000,000 population.

3. Industries built on reclaimed land jutting into Tokyo bay in the northeast section.

Yokohama's wharves, among the world's largest, could accommodate 50,000-ton ships. The B-29s may have caught some damaged shipping in repair docks as they hit the waterfront area's warehouses, docks, canals, railroad spurs and storage facilities.

Site of Many Factories
Most of the enemy's automotive industry was located in three Yokohama factories. The city also was the site of aircraft, steel, rubber, radio, telephone, electrical and many small chemical plants.

Both the shipbuilding and commercial areas were believed to be prime targets for fire bombs. The commercial core is on the southernmost of three deltas on which the city is built.

Yokohama is a terminus for five double or multiple electric railroads. Three fan northward, where Japan's transport system already is sorely crippled by the Tokyo raids, and two run south.

Subterranean Clover to Be Shown to Farmers

Subterranean clover as a means of improving pastures in Douglas county will be shown interested farmers and livestock owners Thursday morning, May 31, at 10 o'clock. Plantings are on the "Doe" Carter ranch five miles from Roseburg on the Garden Valley road, about 1 mile south of the Roseburg Country club.

The plantings include five varieties of subterranean clover made in the fall of 1940 and have

been pastured continually since the summer of 1941 until this spring. A wide range of growth is shown between the different varieties ranging from about four inches to over twelve inches in height. No fertilizers or special care has been given the plantings during the past four years.

Green Light Given Boost In Building Expenditure

erous steps taken within the last month in the field of consumer goods.

Already WPB has ruled that 200,000 passenger cars may be made in 1945 if the automotive industry can find materials without priority help; sewing machine and typewriter makers have received the same go-ahead, but with no restraint on volume of production except ability to locate materials.

Other prime consumer items—refrigerators and washing machines—are considered so urgently needed that WPB has offered priority help for their manufacture. Thus 700,000 washers and 530,000 refrigerators are assured this year, plus as many more as can be built without priority aid.

Such priority assistance is not yet accorded civilian construction activity. But on July 1, WPB will provide an uncontrolled supply of steel, copper and aluminum. These metals may be used for

civilian products newly removed from the prohibited list, which range from lawn mowers to juke boxes. Builders also will have equal access to these metals, and like manufacturers may place orders for them now for delivery after July 1.

The construction relaxation carried with it an increase in the cost limit on hotels and apartment buildings from \$5,000 to \$25,000, on offices, theaters and stores, from \$200 to \$5,000; on churches, hospitals, schools, canals and levees, from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Of perhaps equal importance was WPB's announcement that grading, ditch digging and other earth-moving operations—if they require no installation of materials—now may be freely undertaken as a first step toward building highways, mills, airports and other major projects when reconstruction is farther along.
