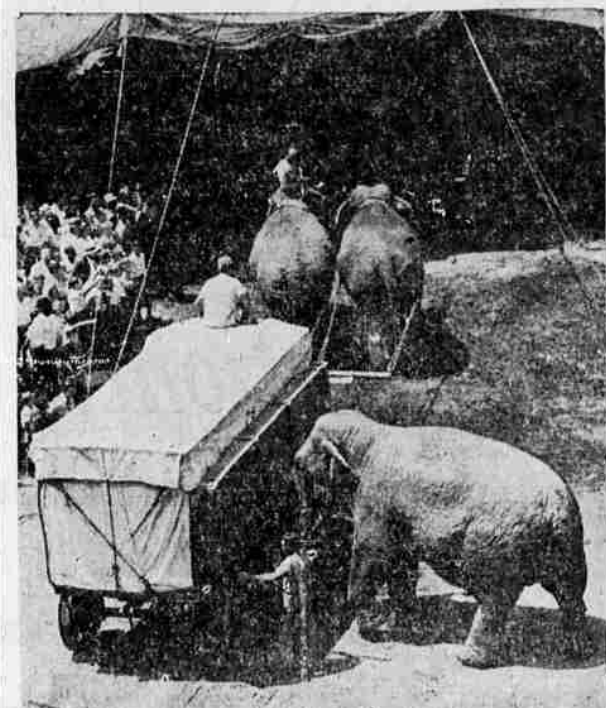

Britain Calls Halt on French Attack in Syria

Japan and the security of the whole Middle East were involved in Britain's course of action. Syrian Blames France

In his Paris statement the Syrian minister declared the Syrian position was that the presence of French troops in the country was unnecessary for strategic purposes as Syria was remote from the Japanese war and the German war was ended.

During the past two years, he said, the autonomy of the Syrian government was respected by Britain, the United States and France, but "now France has ignored Syrian authority; in Alep (Aleppo) they entered and searched the house of the governor; in Damascus the French attacked the police."

The arrival of fresh French troops in the country had coincided with demands for strategic bases in the midst of negotiations for full independence, he said, declaring France had sought to obtain her demands "by a display of force."

The only solution now, he said, is for all French troops to leave the country.

France Blames Meedling
The French, insisting that the trouble was mainly caused by outside interference, claimed documentary evidence to back their stand.

Damascus dispatches written yesterday and received today said chaos prevailed in the Syrian capital after an all-night French bombardment of the city Tuesday night, and Cairo dispatches said heavy fighting continued today.

Clashes occurred all over the country, and a rebellion of the fierce Druz tribesmen in the southern part of Syria apparently was threatened.

Quiet prevailed in the neighboring Levant state of Lebanon.

The trouble flared up Tuesday night, Damascus dispatches said, when Syrian conscripts bolted from the French forces and the French fired into the crowd which welcomed the fugitives.

Each side accused the other of starting the shooting.

Independence Promised
Syria, predominantly Moslem, and Lebanon, predominantly Christian, were mandated to France after the first World war, and were promised their independence when the British and Free French of Gen. De Gaulle used Vichy men and a threatened German invasion in 1941. Their independence was proclaimed in 1943 but negotiations have been complicated by French insistence upon reserving air and naval bases and protection for a French pipeline across the country to the Mosul oil fields. The negotiations were broken off when the French sent troop reinforcements into the Levant.

Communications between Cairo and Damascus were cut, but one report from Jerusalem said the Arabs had captured Deraa, about

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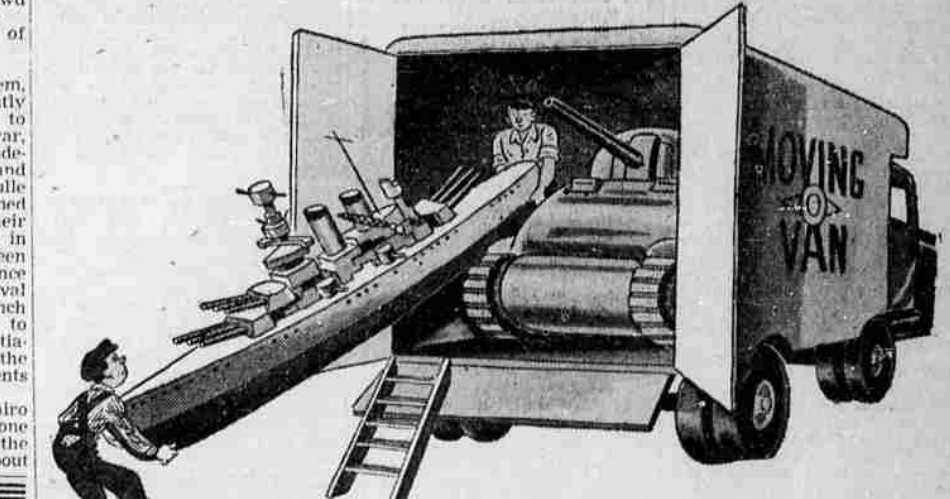
