Washington News From an Inside View

Argument, Sentiment, Comment

Reciprocal Trade Agreements. I shall be glad to have them reported to me, and I will insist upon immediate action. There seems to be entirely too much red tape, too many forms, and too much clerical labor wasted in settling insurance claims.

Contact Unit for Medford. The Veterans administration has notified me that the manager of the Veterans administration in Portland has been granted authority to establish a contact unit, consisting of a contact representative and clerk, at Medford, Oregon. This unit will be opened as soon as arrangements can be completed. In fact, it may be in operation now. Other similar units are being established in Oregon. These units will help materially in handling the problems of veterans.

Academy Exam Soon. I will have some vacancies to fill next year in both the Naval academy at Annapolis and the Military academy at West Point. Such appointments are made on the basis of grade earned in the competitive examination conducted for me by the Civil Service commission. This examination is scheduled to be held July 28. Any boy who desires to compete should notify me immediately. Boys in the armed forces have the same opportunity to compete for these appointments as civilians. Arrangements are made so that the competitive examination may be given by the unit commander of any branch of the armed forces wherever the candidate may be.

Unreasonable Delay. I have recently learned of two cases wherein there has been an unusually long delay in beginning the payment of insurance benefits due on war risk insurance. These cases, or may not, have been exceptional cases. I am wondering if insurance claims are being paid promptly to the people in my congressional district. One of the beneficiaries I refer to has been waiting nearly seven months since the soldier was killed in action, and has received no insurance payment yet. If any such delays are occurring in my district, I shall be glad to hear of them.

Ivan Weikel, Prisoner of Japanese, Writes Home

Mrs. D. O. Tower of Coos Junction has received word from her daughter, Mrs. Esther Weikel, of

Corvallis that she has received three cards written by her husband, Ivan Weikel, who is a prisoner of war at Zentsuji prison camp on Sukoku island of Japan. Mrs. Tower states that the last card was written in December.

All other prizes are to be awarded in form of war bonds and stamps.

Dresses were modeled by Carol Spackman, Rosemary Spackman, Beverly Vanmanburg, Betty Squire and Arline Durr. Ribbons and cash awards were made to all club members completing their work.
