

Purple Heart is Posthumous Award To Richard Burke

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bergh, Roseburg, have received the following from the War department regarding the latter's son, P. F. C. Richard Burke:

"The president has requested me to inform you that the Purple Heart has been awarded posthumously to your son, Private First Class Richard E. Burke, infantry, who sacrificed his life in defense of his country.

"The medal, which you will receive shortly, is of slight intrinsic value, but rich with the tradition for which Americans are so gallantly giving their lives. The Father of our Country, whose profile and coat of arms adorn the medal, speaks from it across the centuries to the men who fight today for the proud freedom he founded.

"Nothing the War department can do or say will in any sense replace the loss of your loved one. He has gone, however, in honor and to the goodly company of patriots. Let me, in communicating to you the country's deep sympathy, also express to you its gratitude for his valor and devotion."

The message is signed by Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war.

Paul Cotellessa, captain, 158th Infantry, writes: "He died courageously, from enemy fire while advancing with his comrades on enemy position near the town of Kulian, Albay province, Luzon, P. I. The remains were interred with appropriate military honors in the United States army cemetery located at Legaspi, Albay province, Luzon, P. I. A protestant chaplain presided at the service." Captain Cotellessa closed his letter by expressing sympathy from the entire company to Mr. and Mrs. Bergh.

Ideas for Spring Meals

CREAMED NEW POTATOES AND PEAS
Add cooked, peeled, new potatoes and cooked peas to medium thick white sauce, sprinkle with paprika.

RADISH SLAW
Combine thinly sliced, washed radishes with salad dressing, season with salt and pepper, and garnish with parsley.

ASPARAGUS WITH MOCK HOLLANDAISE SAUCE
Beat 1 egg white until stiff but not dry; fold in 1 cup mayonnaise. Pour to 1½-inch thickness in shallow baking dish; place 4 to 5 minutes under very hot broiler until delicately browned, about 1 minute. Makes 1 cup. Serve over asparagus.

RHUBARB CREAM PIE
¾ cup sugar 1 tbs. grated
1 tsp. cinnamon orange rind
4 tbs. cornstarch 3 tbs. sugar
½ tsp. salt orange marmalade
2 cups cooked rhubarb Baked pastry shell

Combine sugar, cinnamon, cornstarch, and salt; add to rhubarb; and cook about 10 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Add orange rind and beaten egg yolks; cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Cool; pour into baked pastry shell. Beat egg whites until stiff and dry; fold in orange marmalade. Pile lightly on pie; bake 15 minutes, or until well browned, in slow oven (300° F.). Makes 19-inch pie. Serves 6.

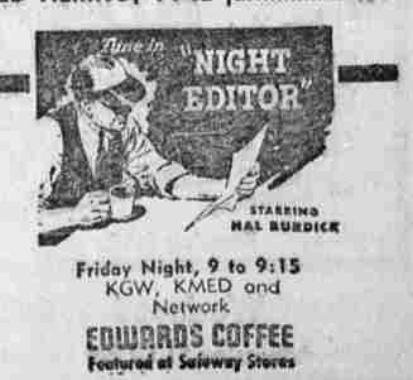
